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From the General Secretary

Ahoy Shipmates

“I feel like a Frenchman at a Trafalgar Night Dinner” was the opening line of Dr Jann Witt’s presentation to our Annual Conference in Liverpool last weekend. Jann (pictured right) is the official historian to the DMB, which is the equivalent of the RNA in Germany, and went on to give us a hugely informative and entertaining briefing on German naval strategy during WWII.



This year’s Conference was set around the commemorations and celebrations marking the 80th anniversary of the turning of the tide in the Battle of the Atlantic (BOA).

In many ways the Conference started with the previous Monday’s online Fireside Chat, with St Neots Branch’s S/M Mike Milne giving an outstanding talk on the Western Approaches Tactical Unit. There we learned that it was actually a group of very bright young Jenny Wrens who did the Operational Analysis to work out how the U-boats were making their attacks and developed the tactics to counter them.

I particularly liked the story about Admiral Max Horton, a former WWI submarine CO and, by then, CINC Western Approaches, playing the role of the U-boat captain on the tactical floor and being defeated five times by a 21-year-old Wren. “You’ve made your point,” he grumbled!



After the introductions at Conference, the Association had the very great honour of being admitted to Liverpool City Council's Freedom Roll of Associations and Institutions (see left). It was such a privilege, and a fitting way to be able to begin our Conference. Our National President has since written to the Lord Mayor, Cllr Mary Rasmussen, requesting she convey our very deep gratitude to the City Council at their next meeting.

We were also fortunate to have the First Sea Lord, Sir Ben Key, teeing us up with a summary of the Royal Navy's current challenges and successes, drawing comparisons between the Navy's role today and that of the Battle of the Atlantic.

And, after Jann, we had Vice Admiral Mike Gretton taking us through the tactical battle of convoy ONS 5 in May 1943, where the Convoy Commander was his father, Peter Gretton, and was reckoned to be the turning point in the tonnage war. The Germans had 60 U-boats at sea at the start of the month and Doenitz had anticipated annihilation of the convoy. Instead, however, 40 of those U-boats did not return and an operational pause was required to reset.

The losses on both sides were horrific and our National President poignantly reminded us, before we stood to remember those who had crossed the bar since we last met, that the Conference landed on the anniversary of the sinking of the Bismarck, with over 2,200 sailors' lives lost.

Along with Gala Dinners, RM Band Concerts, a Drumhead Ceremony and Parade, and a host of other events and attractions on the waterfront to mark BOA 80, the weekend was a tremendous success, and a huge vote of thanks goes out to the Area 10 organising committee, especially Fred Pilgrim and John Arnold, along with Malcolm Little from Central Office. Not an easy Conference to pull together as there were so many competing stakeholders, so BZ to all.

There are so many people to thank after Conference, but my main thanks must go to our two most important guests for the weekend – Wilfred 'George' Osborne and Frank Cooper, both of whom are veterans of the Battle and helped to win us the freedoms we all enjoy today. Thank you to you and all of your amazing generation. We will remember them.

Continuing the theme of Remembrance, last week we hosted the HMS Glamorgan Association when they had Naval Base Commander Cdre John Voyce plant a tree in the Falklands Memorial Garden adjacent to RNA Central Office in HMNB Portsmouth (pictured below). The Garden already has two benches commemorating the two Portsmouth-based warships of the Task Force which were lost, and the tree will serve as a reminder of the 14 of Glamorgan's ship's company who didn't return.



Part II of this serial will be a plaque unveiling and service in the Memorial Garden on 10 July which, somewhat fittingly, is the anniversary of the ship's return to Portsmouth in 1982. Standard Bearers of local Branches would be very welcome to attend along with any old Glamorgans – please let the Ship's Office know if you plan to attend.

7 Battle of the Atlantic 80th Anniversary Commemorations – Northern Ireland

Commemorations for the 80th Anniversary of the turning of the tide in the Battle of the Atlantic were not just held in Liverpool last month.

Northern Ireland played a vital role in the Battle, and events there kicked off on Thursday 11 May with the arrival of a number of international visitors, representing the Canadian High Commission in London, Canada's Naval Memorial Trust, HMCS Sackville in Halifax, Nova Scotia, and the Crow's Nest Officers Club in St John's, Newfoundland.

Old friendships were renewed and new friendships made at the Meet & Greet, hosted by the RNA at the Royal British Legion Club Waterside Branch in Londonderry.



Rear Admiral Santarpia RCN, the Commander, Maritime Forces Atlantic, had asked the Sackville Trustees to convey and present a ship's bell to RNA Londonderry Branch on his behalf, so accordingly, Vice Admiral Dean McFadden CMM CD (Rtd) presented the ship's bell from Scott-class destroyer HMS Malcolm (pictured left), which played a very active role in the Battle of the Atlantic, to Branch Chairman S/M Robert Buchanan.

Vice Admiral McFadden gave a very interesting history of HMS Malcolm up until she was broken up in 1945 – but no one appears to know how the bell of HMS Malcolm ended up spending almost 80 years in Canada!



With the lack of Royal Navy and Royal Canadian Navy assets, attributed to their attendance at the forthcoming events in Liverpool later that month, sadly there were to be no ship visits or waterborne Acts of Remembrance this year.

Friday forenoon saw a group attend a talk hosted by the Museum Services, when historian and author Richard Doherty spoke about the Battle of the Atlantic.

There was a further, and equally enlightening, talk given on Friday afternoon at Aberfoyle House, University of Ulster, Magee Campus, when Dr Adrian Grant spoke of the history of Magee College and the crucial part it played as an administrative and command centre for the Royal Navy and the US Navy during World War 2 as Ebrington Barracks (HMS Ferret).

Shipmates were joined on Friday by a group from the Northern Ireland Submariners Association, RNA National Chairman S/M Keith Ridley and shipmates from other branches of No 12 Area (Ireland).

Friday evening was time to relax with an evening's entertainment hosted by the RNA at the RBL Club.

Saturday evening's events began with a Civic Reception in the Tower Museum, hosted by the Deputy Mayor of Derry and Strabane, Mrs Angela Dobbins. After welcoming speeches from the Museum curator, Ms Roisin Doherty, S/M Robert Buchanan and the Deputy Mayor, refreshments were enjoyed by the assembled guests.

Guests then made their way the short walk to the City Hotel to attend the BOA Commemoration Dinner. Guests were upstanding while the Standards of No 12 Area (Ireland), Londonderry Branch and NI Submariners Association were piped into the dining room by Maurice Devenney. The Standards were received by S/M Keith Ridley, S/M Cdr Tim

Chrishop (Rtd), President No 12 Area (Ireland) and S/M Robert Buchanan, Chairman of Londonderry Branch & No 12 Area (Ireland)

An excellent meal was enjoyed by all and the Loyal Toast to King Charles III was proposed by S/M Keith Ridley. The toast was responded to by Alan Moore, Vice Lord Lieutenant, City of Londonderry. Mr Moore then proposed the toast "To all who served during the Battle of the Atlantic". Vice Admiral McFadden spoke on behalf of the Canadian contingent.

Boatmate Davy George, of the NI Submariners Association, presented S/M Robert Buchanan with a large book, compiled in a joint effort between the MOD and German Naval Historians, entitled 'The U-Boat War in the Atlantic'. This manuscript will be added to the archives of the new Maritime Museum, which is in the planning stages to be in Ebrington Square, formerly known as HMS Ferret during World War 2 and changed to HMS Sea Eagle after the war.

The new Maritime Museum will be right beside the International Sailor Statue which, some will know, was unveiled in 2013 by Prince Michael of Kent. After the speeches and presentations, it was time for music and dancing.

Sunday morning saw preparations for the Parade to All Saints Church Clooney for the Battle of the Atlantic Commemoration Service. The parade was led by the Churchill Band and Standards from No 12 Area (Ireland), S/M Jack Garfield, Vice Chairman No 12 Area (Ireland), Londonderry Branch, S/M Arthur Lapsley; Limavady Branch, S/M Andy Guy; East Antrim Branch, S/M Peter Corry; NI Submariners Association, B/M Jim Brydson, and other veterans associations.

The RAF was represented on parade by Flt Lt Alan Ward and two Airmen. It was especially good to see some 50 cadets on parade, made up of NI Sea Cadets and Naval Contingent Cadets from the CCF.

VIPs included the Lord Lieutenant for the City of Londonderry, Mr Ian Crowe, representing King Charles III; the Deputy Mayor of Londonderry and Strabane, Mrs Angela Dobbins, and Lord Hay of Ballyore. Other guests included Cdr Rob Milligan RN, the Senior Naval Officer Northern Ireland, Cdr Dale Turetski RCN, Canadian Deputy Defence Advisor; Lt Col Michel Tousignant, Deputy Defence Advisor to Ireland, S/M Keith Ridley, RNA National Chairman; S/M Cdr Tim Chrishop RN (Rtd), President No 12 Area (Ireland) RNA and S/M Robert Buchanan, Chairman No 12 Area (Ireland) RNA.

The Service was led by Rev Canon David McBeth, Chaplain of Londonderry Branch RNA, and the congregation included representatives of the Royal Navy, RAF, RNR, Royal Canadian Navy serving and veterans, RNA Branches of Limavady, Belfast and East Antrim, NI Submariners Association, Royal British Legion and other veterans. An interesting sermon was delivered by the Curate Rev Andrea Cotter.



During the Act of Remembrance, a Royal Marines Bugler played the Last Post and Reveille, and the Newfie-Derry Convoy Bell rang out eight bells, rung by S/M Frank Brown, Hon Sec No 12 Area (Ireland). Wreaths were laid on behalf of Canada, the Royal Navy, the RAF, the RNA, HMCS



Sackville, the Crow's Nest Officers Club NL, and the; Merchant Navy.

On the return parade the salute was taken by the Lord Lieutenant for the City of Londonderry, Mr Ian Crowe, representing King Charles III. He was accompanied on the dais by Cdr Rob Milligan RN, Senior Naval Officer Northern Ireland, and Cdr Dale Turetski RCN Commander, Military Policy Adviser, Deputy Naval Adviser, Canadian Defence Liaison Staff (London), Assistant Defence Attaché to Portugal, Canadian Armed Forces.



All were invited to a light lunch hosted by the Londonderry Branch in the Royal British Legion Club Waterside – and that concluded the 2023 Battle of the Atlantic Commemorations in Londonderry.

Thanks go to the Londonderry Port and Harbour for their support, the Museum Services, Magee Campus University of Ulster, Derry & Strabane Mayor's office, the Royal British Legion Waterside Branch & Club and everyone who took time out to support the 80th anniversary of 'the turning of the tide in 1943'.

This would not happen without the shipmates of Londonderry Branch lending their different talents to cover all aspects of delivering a fitting program of events worthy of the memory of the Service and the sacrifice of all those who served and those who died during the longest campaign of the World War 2.

9 War Widows Recognition Payment

The government has published guidance addressing a number of frequently asked questions in response to the lump-sum recognition payment scheme for eligible spouses who forfeited their pensions prior to 2015.

This guidance addresses the FAQs and provides clarification on the eligibility criteria for the lump-sum recognition payment scheme, announced on 17 March 2023.

Widows of serving personnel who forfeited their pensions prior to 2015 could be eligible for a one-off payment of £87,500 as part of the government's continued support for the Armed Forces, their families and veterans.

The new joint initiative from the Ministry of Defence and the Treasury will address old rules in which a cohort of bereaved spouses, civil partners and eligible partners forfeited their pensions if they remarried or cohabited before 2015.

16 HMS Laurentic anniversary commemoration

Shipmates of Londonderry Branch and No 12 Area (Ireland), and their supporters, who organised their own Battle of the Atlantic 80th anniversary commemorations, took the time to remember those who died in a ship lost in an earlier Battle of the Atlantic.



There was an early start on Saturday 13 May as they set out for a commemoration ceremony remembering HMS Laurentic, a liner taken over by the Admiralty, which came to grief as she exited Lough Swilly on the extremely cold night of 25 January 1917. The ship struck two mines, and although all the crew escaped the sinking ship and took to the lifeboats, 354 of them died of exposure and hypothermia, with 121 surviving.

A fitting memorial to the loss of 354 lives has been created on a hill above Fort Dunree overlooking the wreck site, and visitors were treated to an interesting tour of Fort Dunree before assembling at the HMS Laurentic memorial for the ceremony hosted by the Ulster Canada Initiative.

VIPs included the Mayor of Inishowen, Cllr Paul Canning, Canada's Ambassador to Ireland, HE Nancy Smyth, Germany's Ambassador to Ireland, HE Cord Meier-Klodt, Canada's Deputy Defence Advisor to London, Cdr Dale Turetski, Canada's Deputy Defence Attaché to Dublin, Lt Col Michel Tousignant, and S/M Keith Ridley, National Chairman, Royal Naval Association.

During the ceremony an Act of Remembrance was observed, Standards from No 12 Area (Ireland), Londonderry Branch, Limavady Branch and the NI Submariners Association were dipped to the bosun's call. Wreaths were laid on behalf of Ireland, Canada, Germany, the RNA, the Sackville Naval Trust, the Crow's Nest Officers Club and other organisations.

S/M Eddie Lavery recited his poem 'The Morning Dawn' and Maya McClenaghan performed the lament 'Taimse Im Coadh' on the tin whistle, to the delight of the assembled group.

Also in attendance were members of the Canadian Naval Association and community groups from Inishowen.



S/M Keith Ridley noted that S/M Robert Buchanan, Chairman of Londonderry Branch, played a major part not only in the organisation of this event, but also the social gathering with Canadian guests on the Friday evening, and the church service on Sunday at which he was privileged to have read the Gospel.

Keith said Robert is to be congratulated on his support and organisation of this and wider BOA 80 events over the weekend, supported by his wife Lesley – more so as he was recovering from an operation on his back just a week earlier.

Many shipmates think of her as a 'genteel lady' – but read on to discover the real Tricia Cornwell!

More than 50 guests packed into the Borough Arms in Bodmin to welcome this Grande Dame for lunch, with some from as far away as Australia sending their best wishes and apologies for not being there.

Tricia was born in Pool Street, Bodmin on 8 April, 1933 after her Irish parents came to the UK to find work. Tricia was one of ten children who all lived in a small three-bedroom house in Green Lane, Bodmin. Memories of them sleeping head-to-toe to all fit in the bed, and her parents covering the bed with old Army coats in the winter to add extra warmth, are all still very clear.

Tricia said "I remember that me and my siblings were sent to Church Sunday School every week with pennies but we often didn't bother, instead spending the money on sweets instead. We also used to raid the local fields where swedes were grown and pick one or two as we loved the sweet crunchy taste."

Tricia went on to become a nurse in St Lawrence's Hospital, Bodmin, a job she really loved and she enjoyed caring for the patients.

Tricia met her first husband Gerald – a Bow-bell Cockney – at a local dance; she loved dancing and they won many jive dancing trophies. Gerald was a wartime refugee from London and, as his father was a soldier based in Bodmin, that is where he came to stay. They went on to marry at St. Petroc's Church in Bodmin in 1958 and have three children.

They moved to St Mary's Road and have lived there ever since, including whilst the house next door was bombed and razed!

Tricia's husband sadly passed away in December 1986. A few years later she met Vic Cornwell, a stalwart RNA member and standard bearer, who was also widowed at the time. They had known each other for many years as Vic used to court Tricia's sister Shirley. They too married at St. Petroc's.

Vic introduced Tricia to the RNA and it gave her a whole new lease of life – and not just the many and varied social times either. She made many good friends in the RNA. She loves the RNA weekends away and has spent many enjoyable 'retail therapy' trips with her daughter looking for special dresses for the events.



Sadly Vic crossed the Bar in 1998 but that has not deterred Tricia from still attending RNA meetings and functions. She is not easily daunted – Tricia (who had never been on a train or an aeroplane before) decided to go and visit her sister Shirley and her husband Nelson in Queensland, Australia, travelling solo to the other side of the world, changing flights half-way around. "I was just so nervous, I followed everyone else!" Tricia said.

Apart from her three children, and three stepsons, Tricia has 11 grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

Ann, her daughter told the story of her mother Tricia and the “almost Fire Brigade” date: “A couple of months ago I took her to Bristol to visit my daughter, her husband and their children. We stayed at a Travelodge and mum managed to lock herself in the bathroom. I had to go and get the receptionist, who wasn't sure how we would get her out – mum had been in there about 15 minutes and I barged the door and it burst open and we got her out.

“We all fell about laughing – the receptionist was just about to call the Fire Brigade to release her. We reckoned she'd done it on purpose to get a hunky fireman to rescue her!”

Also in the diary is the Area 2 and Maidstone Branch Sea Service, which will be on Sunday 30 July.

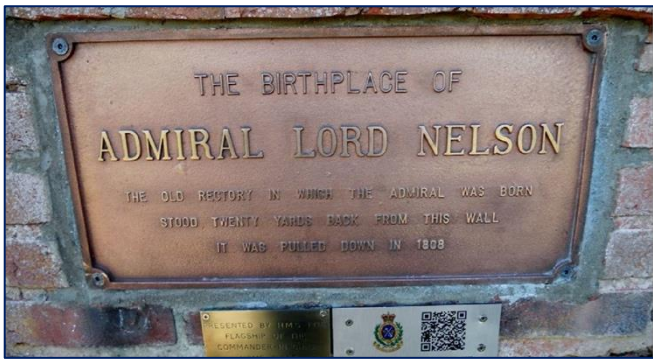

Prior to the march past there was a service in St James the Great church in Copper Chare, for which the church was packed with in excess of 400-500 people, including members of the public and Service personnel alike, as well as veterans from all over Northumberland.

Also among the congregation and taking part in the march were members of Wansbeck Branch of the RNA, which is based at Ashington in Northumberland.

After the parade and march-past, refreshments were on hand at various different places, and there was a formal dinner in the evening at Newsham and New Delaval Social Club in Blyth, attended by more than 120 people.

RNA Christchurch and District Branch

Shipmate Ron Checketts enjoyed a great day with fine weather, a cake and balloons, in celebration of his 102nd birthday.

The veteran received more than 40 cards and messages from friends and family all over the world.

Local friends dropped in with flowers and tasty treats, and some even managed to in some rum so Ron, resplendent in his HMS Ganges cap (pictured right, image by Ron's son Adrian), could have his tot disguised as apple juice...

Ron, a founder and former Chairman of Christchurch and District Branch, was born in Woodford, Wiltshire, and spent many boyhood summers at Hengistbury Head.

His association with Dorset continued when the family were living in Worth Maltravers in 1944 – his father was in the RAF and Mentioned in Despatches for his involvement with the D-Day landings.



In 1936 Ron joined the Royal Navy aged 15 at HMS Ganges and trained as a Telegraphist. When 19 he was on board HMS Arethusa off the Dardenelles when war was declared, before transferring to HMS Capetown as part of the Admiral's Flag Staff, which later transferred to HMS Liverpool. This ship was hit by a bomb from an Italian aircraft; the unexploded device was (gently) removed in Alexandria.

In 1941, having joined the newly-commissioned HMS Manxman, Ron was involved in the Malta Convoys, various actions in the Mediterranean and Operation Mincemeat, when the ship was disguised as a French warship and laid mines off the Italian coast. The ship saw much action, and in December 1942 was torpedoed en route to Gibraltar but did not sink.

Ron then transferred to HMS Phoebe under Squadron Commander Lord Louis Mountbatten, where he served until the war ended. He also served during the Korean War and left the Navy in 1953 as a CPO/Telegraphist.

In Civvy Street, Ron continued in communications, working for the Reuters News Agency for three years before joining the Diplomatic Wireless Service / Foreign Office serving in UK diplomatic missions overseas including Cuba, St Helena, Guyana, Poland, Singapore (twice), Yemen, Sudan, Libya, Tarawa and finally Iraq during the 1981 Iran/Iraq war.

The British Embassy in Baghdad was attacked by terrorists in 1981 and Ron was awarded an MBE upon retirement.

Joan, his wife of 60 years, accompanied him to most overseas postings with his only son Adrian, who was born in Singapore.

Retiring firstly to Marazion in Cornwall, he became Town Clerk as well as an auxiliary Coastguard at Land's End for five years. They then moved to Christchurch, where Ron continues to live, Joan having passed away 14 years ago.

When Ron turned 100 he was asked what his secret was – he replied that he still felt 80 and recommended a hearty breakfast, plenty of rest and a nightly tot!

Date	Year	Entry
1 st	1990	First-of-class Type 23 frigate HMS Norfolk commissioned under the command of Capt Jonathon Band.
2 nd	1981	Invincible-class aircraft carrier HMS Ark Royal launched by the Queen Mother at Swan Hunter on the River Tyne.
3 rd	1980	The Royal Navy's first hydrofoil was accepted into the Service – HMS Speedy, a militarised version of the 117-ton commercial Boeing 929 Jetfoil. Originally intended to be the first of a class of 12, the vessel – capable of 40 knots on its foil – was found to be not what the Navy needed in a fishery patrol or minehunting craft, and she was sold into mercantile service in 1986. She went on to serve as a ferry between Hong Kong and Macau for more than three decades, but is now thought to be awaiting the scrapyard.
4 th	1941	Four of German battleship Bismarck's supply vessels were sunk in the Atlantic – the warship itself was sunk by a powerful Naval force on 27 May.
5 th	1939	Admiral Sir Andrew Browne Cunningham – the legendary ABC – arrived at Alexandria and the following day took over as C-in-C Mediterranean, hoisting his flag in HMS Warspite. The highly-decorated officer, born in Dublin in 1883, went on to become one of the most influential Naval officers of World War 2, winning key battles and keeping supply lines open for Allied forces.
6 th	1944	D-Day, the opening phase of the Battle of Normandy (Operation Overlord), was put into action, landing troops and equipment on the Northern coast of France. Almost 7,000 vessels took part in D-Day and subsequent landings, known as Operation Neptune; more than 1,200 of them were warships, and although the invasion fleet was drawn from eight countries, the vast majority were British or Canadian (almost 80 per cent).

		Despite fierce opposition in some sectors, by the end of D-Day a beachhead had been established on each of the five landing beaches. The greatest amphibious invasion in history, which saw 160,000 Allied troops cross the Channel on D-Day alone, marked the beginning of the end of the war in Europe, with Allied forces eventually fighting their way across France and into Germany.
7th	1960	HMS Vanguard, the Royal Navy's final and largest battleship, decommissioned at Portsmouth. The 51,000-ton fast battleship, the design for which was much modified as World War 2 progressed, had a ship's company of almost 2,000 and served for almost 15 years.
8th	1948	Lt Cdr Eric 'Winkle' Brown landed a Gloster Meteor on the flight deck of HMS Implacable, the first time a twin-engined jet had landed on a British carrier. Implacable was the deck-landing training carrier for the British Fleet.
9th	1931	Parthian-class submarine HMS Poseidon collided with a Chinese freighter during exercises off Wei-Hei-Wei naval base in China. 31 of her crew managed to scramble clear as the boat rapidly sank in 130ft of water, while a further five used the new Davis Submerged Escape Apparatus (DSEA) to escape the sunken craft; three died during or just after the escape, and a further 18 were lost with the boat. It is believed the Chinese salvaged the wreck in the early 1970s.
10th	1971	The first of the Type 42 destroyers, HMS Sheffield, was launched at the Vickers yard in Barrow-in-Furness by the Queen. Two dockyard workers had died in an explosion during her build, and the damaged section of her hull was replaced by a section from her identical sister, Hercules, which was being built for the Argentine navy.
11th	1940	The Siege of Malta began – an attempt by the Axis powers to starve and bomb the British Crown Colony into submission, strengthening their North Africa campaign. Through perilous resupply convoys and plucky air defence the island held out and the siege was effectively ended in late 1942 when, after the Torch landings in North Africa, Allied forces on the island switched from defence to attacking Axis shipping and troops.
12th	1797	End of the mutiny at The Nore, in the Thames Estuary. In sharp contrast to the Spithead mutiny, of the same period (which was sparked by a call for better pay and conditions) there were political elements to the Nore mutiny, as a result of which 29 of the leaders hanged, a further 29 were imprisoned, nine flogged and a number of others were transported to Australia, though many of the ordinary sailors caught up in the mutiny were not punished.
13th	1514	King Henry VIII launched the Henry Grace a Dieu (Henry, Thanks be to God), a carrack or 'great ship' of 1,500 tons and a complement of 700 men at Woolwich on the Thames. She was the largest and most powerful warship in the world at the time (mounting 41 cannon and 141 lighter swivel guns), though as she was top-heavy she handled poorly and was not a good fighting platform until she was remodelled in 1536. She saw little meaningful action, and was destroyed by an accidental fire at Woolwich in 1553.
14th	1982	As 3 Cdo Bde and 5th Infantry Bde prepared for the final assault on Stanley, the capital of the Falkland Islands, Argentine commanders offered to negotiate for a surrender, which came into effect locally late on the same day and ended the active combat phase of the Falklands Campaign.

15 th	1968	Submarine HMS Resolution began the first Polaris nuclear deterrent patrol, a programme which lasted until May 1996, when the Trident fleet completed the phased takeover of the deterrent responsibility.
16 th	1987	Armoured frigate HMS Warrior (1860) arrived in Portsmouth after a four-day voyage from Hartlepool, where the ironclad had been restored. Commissioned in August 1861, the innovative ship was virtually obsolete within a decade, and was finally struck off the active list in 1900. She served as a storage hulk, and was then moved to Pembroke Dock in 1929 to serve as a floating oil jetty. In 1979 she was towed to Hartlepool, where she underwent an eight-year £9m restoration programme.
17 th	1934	Two Naval officers, Lts Luce and Field – the former would go on to become First Sea Lord – were amongst passengers and crew taken hostage by pirates while aboard the steamship Shuntien in the estuary of the Yellow River in China. The response was perhaps unexpected by the outlaws – the UK, the United States and Japan all sent warships to the area, including aircraft carrier HMS Eagle, and three days later the Admiralty was able to report that, “as a result of naval action”, the British submariners were safe aboard destroyer HMS Whitshed, while other hostages were released on 23 June.
18 th	1940	RN Air Station Yeovilton in Somerset was commissioned as HMS Heron. Initially specialising in training Naval fighter pilots and Observers, the station has been in continuous use since then, and is currently home of the Navy’s Commando Helicopter Force Merlin and Wildcat squadrons.
19 th	2003	Amphibious assault ship HMS Albion was commissioned at Devonport Naval Base in the presence of her sponsor, The Princess Royal, and Admiral of the Fleet Sir Henry Leach, who had been in command of the previous Albion, the Centaur-class light Fleet aircraft carrier.
20 th	1944	Capt Frederic ‘Johnnie’ Walker, scourge of the U-boats in the Battle of the Atlantic, was Mentioned in Despatches, having been awarded a third bar to his Distinguished Service Order a week before. Walker had helped establish an impenetrable barrier across the Channel for the Normandy Landings, earlier in the month preventing U-boats from approaching the invasion fleet, but he would be dead within a month from a cerebral thrombosis, thought to be caused by overworking and exhaustion.
21 st	1919	German High Seas Fleet scuttled at Scapa Flow, in the Orkney Islands north of Scotland. The warships had been interned there after the Armistice, but fearing the ships could be used against Germany or that the British would simply seize them, their commander, Admiral Ludwig von Reuter, ordered the ships be scuttled. Royal Navy guardships were able to beach some of the vessels, but 52 of the 74 warships sank. A number of wrecks were salvaged and used as scrap in the inter-war period.
22 nd	1893	Mediterranean Fleet flagship HMS Victoria sank off Lebanon after being rammed by battleship during a botched manoeuvre on annual exercises. Victoria sank in around 15 minutes, and almost 360 sailors – including Fleet Commander Vice Admiral Sir George Tryon – went down with the ship. Tryon was a highly-regarded ship-handler, who had won many plaudits for his tact and diplomacy on assignments around the world, and he was also a radical moderniser, but a brusque manner meant junior officers were loathe to question a decision, so when the ambiguous order was given for the two columns of ships to

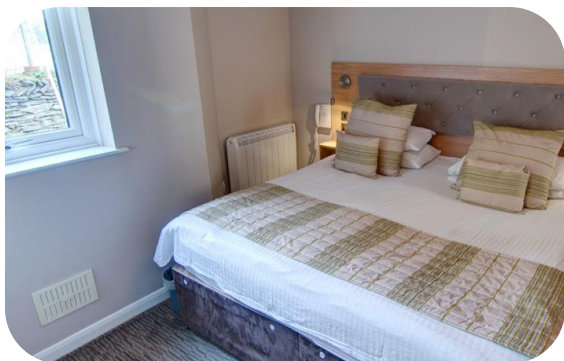
		reverse course in turn, no one queried it, and the fatal collision occurred. Tryon reportedly went down with his ship saying “It is all my fault...”
23 rd	1925	PO Robert Mills Chalmers, of Insect-class gunboat HMS Tarantula, won the EGC (later George Cross) for his actions as part of an armed party protecting British concessions from rioting students and soldiers at Shameen, Guangzhou, in China. The rioting was part of the nationwide May Thirtieth Movement against foreign-run industries, and peace was not restored until November that year.
24 th	1943	Sloop HMS Starling sank U-119, while Black Swan sister ships Wild Goose, Woodpecker and Wren, and modified Black Swan sloop Kite, sank U-449, both actions taking place in the Bay of Biscay.
25 th	1975	Final Beira Patrol ended with Mozambique gaining independence from Portugal and making assurances that no oil would be trans-shipped to Rhodesia. The Patrol was set up on 1 March 1966 to blockade oil shipments to the former colony, now Zimbabwe, which had unilaterally declared independence from the UK the previous year and thus attracted sanctions from the United Nations.
26 th	1959	The formal opening of the St Lawrence Seaway, a series of navigable channels and river courses connecting the Atlantic Ocean to the Great Lakes, was marked by a short cruise by the Royal Yacht Britannia, with the Queen, the Duke of Edinburgh and American president Dwight D Eisenhower on board, escorted by Type 15 frigate HMS Ulster.
27 th	1942	Convoy PQ 17 left Hvalfjordur in Iceland, bound for Arkhangelsk in the Soviet Union. Warships escorting the convoy were withdrawn when information came through that the German Tirpitz battlegroup had left harbour, but in fact the powerful Axis force was simply shifting to another fjord. However, the merchantmen of PQ 17 were ordered to proceed independently to Soviet ports, but many were picked off by U-boats and air attacks; of 36 merchant ships that left Iceland, only 11 reached Arkhangelsk.
28 th	1977	The Silver Jubilee Fleet Review was held at Spithead – some 180 ships from 18 nations in ten lines stretching seven miles, and a fly-past of 150 aircraft.
29 th	1941	U-651 was sunk in the North Atlantic, south of Iceland, in a combined attack by destroyers HM Ships Malcolm and Scimitar, Flower-class corvettes Arabis and Violet and Halcyon-class minesweeper Speedwell. All 46 of the U-boat crew were rescued.
30 th	1969	Type 82 destroyer HMS Bristol was launched on the Tyne by Swan Hunter. The only one of a planned class of four, originally designed as air defence ships for the cancelled CVA-01 aircraft carriers, Bristol saw service in the Falklands Conflict. She was converted to a training ship in 1987, but suffered a boiler explosion in 1991 which proved too expensive to repair, and she became a harbour training ship at HMS Excellent, Whale Island, in Portsmouth Harbour.



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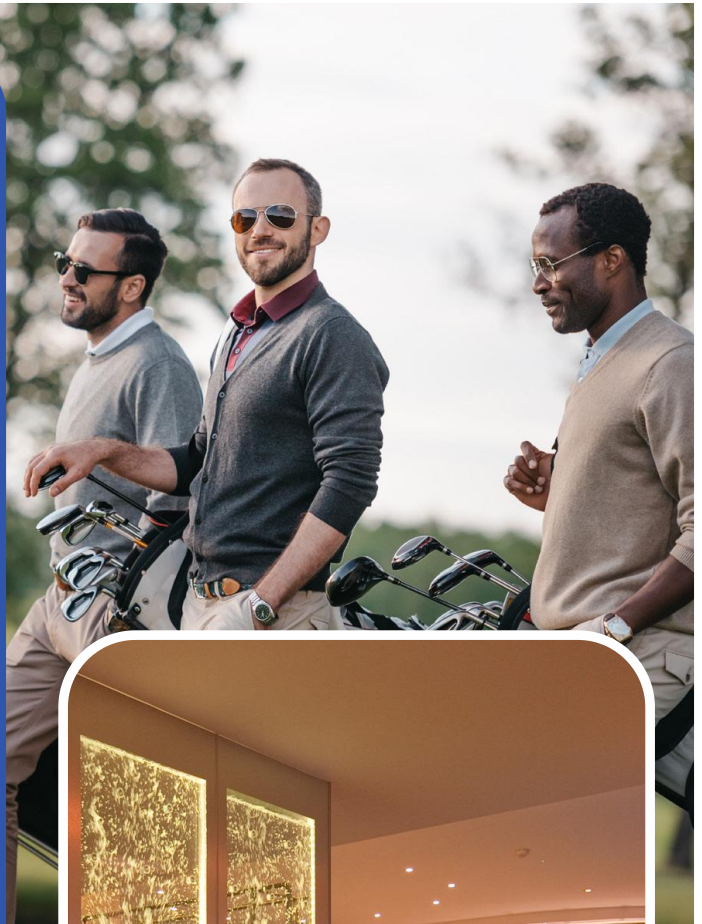
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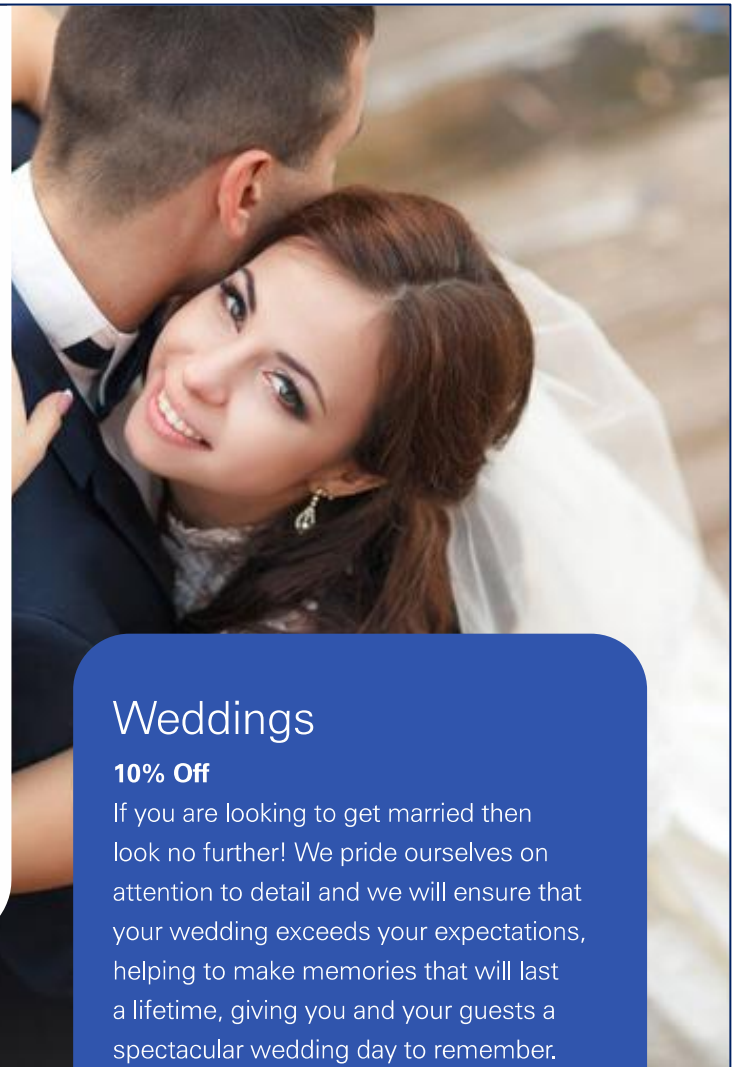


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
