#### > MEMORIAL TREE PLANTED FOR HMS GLAMORGAN

Exactly 41 years to the day after County-class destroyer HMS Glamorgan returned home to Portsmouth from the South Atlantic, a plaque was unveiled in the Royal Naval Association's Memorial Garden remembering the 14 members of her ship's company lost during the Falklands Conflict.

The dedication ceremony was attended by many members of the ship's company and their family members, and wreaths were laid by Admiral Sir Ian Andrew Forbes, KCB, CBE, who was Operations Officer in Glamorgan, and Vice Admiral John McAnally, CB, LVO, on behalf of the Royal Naval Association.

Remembrance crosses were laid in memory of the 14 who lost their lives, with one in memory of those who have died since the conflict.

Cdr Alan Watt, Chairman of the HMS Glamorgan Falklands Association, said: "We have three major memorials – a memorial window in Portsmouth Cathedral, a bench at the National Memorial Arboretum and a memorial near Stanley, close to the spot the Exocet which hit us was fired.

"We felt that there was still one link missing in the chain and Portsmouth Dockyard was our home port. To have the opportunity to have something in the Naval Base in the Royal Naval Association's memorial garden, which already includes benches for two of the ships lost, HMS Coventry and HMS Sheffield, seemed extremely fitting."

On 12 June 1982 the Falklands Conflict was at a critical stage, with British forces closing in on the Argentine invaders at the islands' capital, Stanley.

The Royal Marines of 45 Commando had been given the task of taking Two Sisters Mountain to the west of Stanley, a tough proposition after their gruelling yomp across the island of East Falkland.

HMS Glamorgan covered the commandoes' advance, joining the gunline late the previous evening and, along with frigate HMS Yarmouth, putting more than 400 shells onto Two Sisters and nearby Mount Harriet, further south, during the night.

The warships withdrew around 0530, and as Glamorgan prepared to return to the Carrier Battle Group offshore, her command team was mindful of the threat posed by shore-based attacks and carefully avoided the recognised danger zones around the coast.

But it is thought that the Argentines had managed to move one of their land-based Exocet missiles launchers, taken from a warship and mounted on a lorry, further east towards the shore, so while Glamorgan passed that point around 20 miles out to sea, just outside the perceived danger zone, an Exocet was successfully fired.

Frigate HMS Avenger, in company with Glamorgan, spotted the missile and raised the alarm, but Glamorgan only had time to turn sharply to present her stern – the strongest part of the ship – to the threat.

The missile glanced off the upper deck coaming, slid along and exploded near the hangar, killing eight sailors and destroying her armed and fully-fuelled Wessex helicopter, while also blowing a hole in the deck through which burning fuel poured; a further five men died here. All 13 were buried at sea that evening.

A 14th man died of his injuries just over two months later.

Though the ship's gas turbine engines were temporarily put out of action, within three hours or so the fires were contained and the ship's steam turbines used to move her out of danger and back with the carrier group.

After the Argentine surrender, just two days later, the ship steamed into the sheltered waters of San Carlos for repairs, and she left the Falklands on 21 June, reaching Portsmouth Naval Base on 10 July after more than 100 days continuously at sea.

Glamorgan has the dubious honour of being the first ship to survive being struck by an Exocet.

Connell CBE will be taking the salute with
the Royal Naval Volunteer Band Association
providing music and the Chaplain of the

Shipmates wishing to take part should be in King Charles Street ready for a briefing no later than 1025. The Standard Bearers brief will take place a littler earlier at 1010.

The parade is due to conclude at approximately 1145 with attendees retiring to the Civil Service Club in Great Scotland Yard for refreshments and to enable serving and veteran personnel from across the Naval Service to gather together.

## > GOVERNMENT HOTLINE SUPPORTS HOMELESS VETERANS

Vulnerable veterans across the UK now have access to Op Fortitude, a new dedicated referral pathway for homeless veterans, including those sleeping on the streets.

The innovative hotline is part of a two-year £8.55 million programme to fulfil the government's pledge to end veteran rough sleeping.

The Veterans' Strategy Action Plan 2022-24 sets out the intention to achieve this within the current Parliament, but thanks to new funding it is hoped this will be achieved ahead of schedule.

Run by social housing provider Riverside Group, the £500,000 housing hotline will give homeless veterans a single point of contact to get them the help they need.

Op Fortitude staff will refer callers to a network of support, including housing providers, charities and local authorities. Minister for Veterans' Affairs Johnny Mercer said: "Everyone deserves a place they can call home, not least those who have served their country. Today's launch is a huge milestone in ending veteran homelessness and a clear demonstration of this government delivering on its promises."

Transitioning from the Armed Forces remains a challenge for some and this programme has been designed to support 1,300 vulnerable veterans over two years across almost 60 housing complexes, ranging from apartment blocks to shared houses.

Projects by nine housing providers will target difficult problems so that veterans can get back on their feet and thrive in civilian life. Wraparound services include specialist medical care, connections with local communities and the tools they need to get jobs.

All nine projects will be ready to take Op Fortitude referrals by September, expanding the pathway's network of housing providers from 10 to 14. This includes plugging into a network of 650 homes across Scotland with Veteran Homes Scotland, as well as a brand new consortium of housing across the North West of England.

The MOD are working on a digital service that will issue previously unclaimed medals, and they are looking for people to take part in their research.

A research session will last 30-45 minutes, will be held remotely and they will arrange a suitable date and time with you.

#### They want to speak to a wide range of people – as long as you can:

- join the session from a computer or tablet/phone, with an active internet connection
- come prepared to offer completely honest and open feedback

There is no monetary incentive for this research, but your feedback will help them shape the service for all users.

Contacting the MOD to find out more is not a commitment to take part – you can change your mind at any time. If you decide to withdraw, all they ask is that you let them know, and they will remove your details – you do not need to provide them with a reason.



## > FURTHER PROGRESS ON ARMED FORCES VETERAN CARD

The Ministry of Defence and the Office for Veterans' Affairs are jointly delivering this service as part of ongoing improvements in veterans support – and creating the process to supply these cards has proved to be a significant technical project.

With the MOD now driving the initiative towards the delivery phase, a new verification service to support applications will include:

- online applications via GOV.UK
- identity checks using GOV.UK's new One Login service
- automated service checking to confirm veteran status for most applications using MOD service records databases
- increasing MOD's secure card printing capacity to deal with the expected applications using a new high-capacity card printing machine

The HM Armed Forces Veteran Card will allow veterans to quickly and easily prove their veteran status where required, thereby granting them simpler access to key support from government, charities, local authorities, and other organisations.

Roll-out will be in phases according to service years to manage the volume of requests and prevent any potential delays resulting from demand exceeding capacity.

With more than 1.8 million veterans in the UK, the MOD is focused on building the technology and processes to deal with large volumes of card applications accurately and securely.

Testing started this summer, and they expect cards to become available to veterans later this year. A paper-based application process will also be made available for veterans who are unable to use the online service.

Since December 2018, all Service leavers automatically receive a Veteran Card from the MOD as part of their discharge process and so do not need to apply, though the new verification service will also address how to replace a lost Veteran Card.



#### > GOVERNMENT APOLOGISES TO VETERANS OVER HISTORIC ARMED FORCES LGBT POLICY

The government has apologised for the treatment of LGBT (lesbian, gay, bisexual and trans) veterans, following the publication of an independent review into the UK Armed Forces' pre-2000 ban on LGBT personnel.

The formal apology by the government was delivered by Prime Minister Rishi Sunak and Defence Secretary Ben Wallace, and Mr Sunak described the policy as "an appalling failure of the British state – decades behind the law of this land."

The independent review, chaired by Lord Etherton and co-commissioned by the MOD and the Office for Veterans Affairs, examined the experiences of personnel between 1967 and 2000 who were impacted by the ban on homosexuality in the Armed Forces.

The government has previously said that the treatment of LGBT personnel and veterans in the Armed Forces prior to the year 2000 was completely unacceptable and highly regrettable.

Lord Etherton's report found that investigations in an individual's sexuality were intrusive, invasive, and for some caused long-lasting and severe impacts to the lives of veterans and their families.

The review highlights the government's unwavering commitment to understanding how best to support its veteran and LGBT community and acknowledges that it fully accepts that their treatment before 2000 was not acceptable.

In recognition of this the Prime Minister and Defence Secretary formally apologised in the House of Commons on 19 July to all those who were affected and mistreated in the enactment of the ban.

The review focused on three main areas, with the primary one being the effect the historic policy may have had on those impacted by the ban, including the consequences for their future lives

It also looked at the accessibility of veterans' services for LGBT people and how to ensure that LGBT veterans are recognised and fully accepted as members of the Armed Forces.

Speaking in the Commons, Mr Sunak said: "The ban on LGBT people serving in our military until the year 2000 was an appalling failure of the British state – decades behind the law of this land.

"As today's report makes clear, in that period many endured the most horrific sexual abuse and violence, homophobic bullying and harassment while bravely serving this country.

"Today, on behalf of the British state, I apologise, and I hope all those affected will be able to feel part of the proud veteran community that has done so much to keep our country safe."

Mr Wallace said: "I am pleased that this review has shone a much-needed light on a shameful and unacceptable historical chapter in our Armed Forces history." Retired Naval officer and RNA member Craig Jones, Executive Chair, and Caroline Paige, Chief Executive of LGBT+ military charity Fighting With Pride, said: "Finally the voices of those who have lived for decades in the shadow of this abhorrent policy have been heard and their truth told.

"Today's apology from the Prime Minister recognises the suffering of veterans who met the challenges of service life but faced many cruel treatments from those in whom they placed their trust.

"Lord Etherton's report is a visceral account of the damage done and the opportunity for this government to put in place substantial reparations. We must wash away the shame felt by these veterans and bring a just and honourable end to this unjust and dishonourable war."

# > THE LAUNCH OF THE LGBT VETERANS INDEPENDENT REVIEW REPORT AND APOLOGY FROM THE PRIME MINISTER AND THE SECRETARY OF STATE FOR DEFENCE

In our families today, many of us have children, nephews, nieces, grandchildren, or simply friends and neighbours who are LGBT+. In our modern world we respect people for who they are and recognised that in being themselves they are expressing the peace and freedoms that many members have faced hardship and danger to protect. Today LGBT+ personnel take their place at the front line of operations all over the world, just as so many of us did. They are welcomed in their units, they do a good job and they are respected. Sadly this has not always been the case, and Lord Ethertons LGBT Veterans Independent Review, launched last month, provides in its 270 pages the accounts of over 1100 veterans and families who experienced or witnessed treatment of our shipmates that was cruel and in some cases damaging.

In 2020, with Shipmate Patrick Lyster-Todd, I founded the charity Fighting With Pride to find those who live their lives in the shadow of the cruelty of the ban. Many of these veterans are impoverished by broken careers and little or no pensions, with poor housing, isolated from others and in poor health. I am immensely proud that the RNA has supported Fighting With Pride every step of our journey, helping us ensure that operational service medals are restored, that these veterans can afford a train ticket to

attend the Cenotaph and that they can meet others who faced the same fate, to swing the lamp about better times.

Lord Etherton has made 49 recommendations which aim to ensure that the historic ill treatment of this community of veterans, is confined to history. These veterans must feel the shame they have felt is washed away and that they can wear their medals and march alongside us with pride for their contribution to the defence of the United Kingdom.

The first of the 49 recommendations was that the Prime Minister should make an apology in the House of Commons on behalf the State. He did this on Wednesday 19th July at 1200. For many, this apology reflected that in the 23 years since the ban was lifted, organisations that support veterans were 'sleeping on watch' and not aware of the empty chairs in their mess.

So does this mean that everything at RNA has a rainbow on it!! No! it simply means that the RNA family is now complete, with no empty chair in the mess. Perhaps during Pride Month, we might ask the buntings to run up a Pride flag and we might raise a glass in recognition of their service.

As well as businesses the event has both support organisations and training providers to give an all-round approach to finding your next career as well as informing you about which pathways you can take to get there.



## > FOCUS ON... ROYAL NAVY TRAILBLAZERS

For an organisation with as long a history as the Royal Navy you would expect it to be able to adapt to change, whether that be dictated by the enemy, the environment or technology.

But over the thousand years or more of the RN and its predecessors – the English Navy and the Old Scots Navy – sailors, tacticians and shipbuilders did not simply adapt to change. More often than not they were leading the way, blazing a trail that the rest of the world followed.

A glance through this month's Swinging the Lamp encapsulates that pioneering spirit, and in typical Navy fashion that covers land, sea and air.

The innovative ironclad HMS Warrior was commissioned in August 1861, while 40 years later the first warship powered by steam turbines, destroyer HMS Viper, was lost after grounding in the Channel Islands (pictured – Imperial War Museum image © IWM Q 75024).

It was a Royal Navy destroyer, HMS Lance, that fired the first British shot of World War 1, while in a much later war – in Korea – a Royal Navy Sea Fury became the first piston-engined aircraft to shoot down a jet.

Other August Royal Navy anniversaries include the first successful aerial torpedo attack on an enemy warship, the launch of the first warship in the world powered by gas turbines and pioneering wireless communication work. August is not an unusual month for such events – right across the calendar, and throughout the centuries, you will find examples where a member of the Royal Navy broke the mould and moved everything forward.

Nelson's famous tactical tour de force of breaking the line of the Franco-Spanish fleet at Trafalgar is a classic example – and it wasn't even Nelson's idea in the first place.

By 1805 breaking the line was a well-established option, which had been used in varying degrees of success by, to name but a few, Rodney at the Battle of the Saintes more than 20 years earlier, by Duncan at Camperdown in 1797 and indeed by Nelson himself at the Battle of the Nile the following year.

Breaking the Franco-Spanish line of ships at Trafalgar was a no-brainer for Nelson's forces, which though outnumbered were far superior at gunnery and would thrive in the confusion of the melee which developed from the enemy fleet's dislocation.

But where Nelson so clearly displayed the 'Nelson Touch' was in his preparation for the battle, and his trust in the abilities of his captain and ship's companies. Instead of relying on signals, which were notoriously difficult to read and easy to misinterpret in the heat and smoke of battle, Nelson outlined his plan before battle was joined, but allowed his captains to decide how best to contribute, ensuring his fleet reacted much more quickly to the course of the battle than his opposite number, Villeneuve.





Such innovative tactics, and adaptation of established principles, is just one aspect of the Royal Navy's trailblazing record.

There is plenty of evidence of the early embracing of technological change and giant leaps forward in the application of that technology throughout the history of the Royal Navy.

Just as the iron-hulled HMS Warrior had in the mid-Victorian era, battleship HMS Dreadnought incorporated numerous innovations, a daring combination of new ideas and equipment, resulting in a revolutionary ship which began sea trials in the autumn of 1906, a year and a day after construction started at Portsmouth Dockyard.

She was a stunning success – the fastest and most powerful warship in the world at her launch, and at a stroke consigning all existing capital ships to footnotes of history (and sparking an arms race as the most powerful nations of the world rushed to copy the Senior Service and upgrade their navies.)

Less than a decade after Dreadnought's appearance on the scene came another stunning Royal Navy first – the appearance on the scene of what would become the first recognisable modern-style aircraft carrier, HMS Furious (pictured – Imperial War Museum image © IWM RAE-O 659), which saw its fore and aft flight decks combined into a through deck after World War 1.

It was on this ship in August 1917 that Edwin Dunning took his courage in both hands and became the first pilot to land an aircraft on a moving ship, though sadly the daring aviator died less than a week later attempting the feat for a third time.

The small island superstructure, angled flight decks, optical landing systems and the steam catapult all first appeared on British aircraft carriers as the Royal Navy continued to lead the way in naval aviation.

And it's not just in the obvious fields of hardware and tactics that the Royal Navy leads – Naval doctors and medics made groundbreaking discoveries over the years, whether it was doctor James Lind's experiments with citrus fruit and scurvy in 1747 – the first controlled clinical experiments in the history of medicine – or the innovative treatment of burns victims during the Falklands Conflict in 1982.

Today sees the Royal Navy and industry partners still at the cutting edge of unmanned vehicle technology as well as continuing to develop world-beating ships, submarines and aircraft, blazing a trail of innovation that stretches back for centuries.

#### > EMPLOYMENT NEWS

#### The Civil Service – 'a great place to work for veterans'

In February 2020 the government announced the introduction of a new initiative to make the Civil Service 'A Great Place to Work for Veterans'.

There are around 2.2 million Armed Forces veterans in the UK and every year around 15,000 people leave the Armed Forces. Around 60 per cent of them are under 35, with most seeking to take up a new career or job opportunities in civilian employment.


As well as making the Civil Service the most inclusive employer in the UK the government is also committed to maximising the support and recognition for veterans in society. This includes those aspects and opportunities, such as employment in high-quality jobs, which help them to flourish and successfully make the transition from life in the Armed Forces to civilian employment.

Veterans also bring with them unique skills and experience and many of the values which the Civil Service also thrives on; a commitment to public service, team work, inclusion, creativity and drive.

Many veterans already work in the Civil Service and make a huge contribution to the organisation, and this initiative aims to encourage more veterans to take this step. These new measures are focused on roles at all grades, functions and professions across the Civil Service.

Under the scheme, veterans who meet the minimum criteria for a role will progress to the next stage of selection. In most cases this will be an interview, but depending on the vacancy it may be another method of selection such as an online test or an assessment centre.

Roles available under the scheme will be clearly marked. If you are an applicant and are unsure, you should contact the vacancy manager or recruitment point of contact. Roles selected for this initiative will be externally advertised, and can be either temporary or permanent, and at any grade.



#### To be eligible for this scheme in the Civil Service, you must:

- have served for at least one year in Her Majesty's Armed Forces (as a Regular or Reserve); this includes time spent training
- be in transition from, or ceased to be a member of, HM Armed Forces
- not already be a civil servant, or be employed by a Civil Service Commission accredited public body

There is no maximum time limit from when you left HM Armed Forces to be eligible for this initiative.

When you apply for a role through Civil Service Jobs, you will be prompted to enter whether you are eligible for the Great Place to Work Initiative and whether you would like to apply for the role through this route.

Please note that during pre-employment checks for a role in the Civil Service, your employment history will be checked. An attempt to use this initiative fraudulently may result in your application being terminated.

The assessment approach, along with the criteria required for the role, will be outlined in the job vacancy or candidate information pack. You can find out more about careers in the civil service at Civil Service Careers and find vacancies at Civil Service Jobs.

In order to use the Great Place to Work for Veterans initiative, you must also meet the minimum standard for the role you would like to apply for – this is the combination of experience, behaviours, strengths, abilities and technical/professional skills that a candidate will need to perform effectively in the role.

The minimum standard will be clearly set out in the job vacancy or the candidate information pack.

It may not always be practicable or appropriate to interview all veterans who meet the minimum criteria for the job. For example, in high-volume recruitment, the employer may wish to limit the overall number of interviews by selecting the candidates who best meet the minimum criteria for the job rather than all of those that meet the minimum criteria.

In these circumstances, organisations can select the candidates who best meet the minimum criteria for the job rather than all of those that meet the minimum criteria.

## > AUGUST RNA SEMAPHORE CIRCULAR OBITUARIES



#### Shipmate Mike Bull

City of Inverness Branch members are mourning the loss of their Founder Member and friend Shipmate Mike Bull, who will be sadly missed by them all.

Mike is survived by his wife Judith, two daughters and three grandsons. His funeral was well attended by family, friends and members of the Branch, who formed a guard of honour led by Shipmate Bob Coburn carrying the City of Inverness Branch Standard.

Mike was dedicated to the RNA, helping to establish the Inverness Branch and becoming the Founding Chairman. Later he ran the very successful Ancient Mariner newsletter, keeping the membership abreast of the latest comings and goings.

He joined the Royal Navy as a boy seaman aged 15, and by the time he was 18 he had seen more of the world than most people see in their entire lifetime. In all he served on 11 ships and submarines.

In 1957 he qualified as a submariner and earned his gold dolphins, and eight years later he became a minewarfare and clearance diving officer. In 1964 he was commissioned as a Sub Lieutenant, was promoted to Lieutenent four years later, and to Lieutenant Commander in 1973.

By the time of his retirement in 1994 he had been promoted nine times, served on 11 ships and at nine shore establishments, taught at the RN College, Dartmouth, commanded vessels at sea, and developed new tactics and procedures – some still in use today. He had defused bombs, torpedoes and other explosives, and if you asked him, he would tell you without hesitation that he would have done it all again.

Rest easy Shipmate – your watch is done. Fair winds and a following sea.

#### Stan Keetley

It is with great regret that the Nottingham Branch announce that their Branch/Club President Shipmate Stan Keetley crossed the bar on 8 June at the grand age of 96 years young.

Shipmate Stan volunteered to join the Royal Navy during World War 2 at the age of 16, and was finally called up for service a year later aged 17, going on to train as a Wireless Telegraphist. On completion of training Stan was drafted to a destroyer to join the UK/American task group which was to land troops on the beaches of Japan – he was to have been landed there with them, to act a communications link.

The dropping of the atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki cancelled this operation and he was then drafted to the 10th Minesweeping Squadron (Algerines) clearing mines from the China Sea around Hong Kong.

Shipmate Stan joined the RNA in the early 1970s and was always a keen supporter of Nottingham Branch. In November 2020 he was awarded Life Membership in grateful appreciation and recognition of his service to the country during the war.

His cheerful attitude will be sadly missed by members of the Nottingham Branch – Fair Winds and Following Seas, Shipmate.









#### John MacKinnon Beaton and Catherine Black McIntosh

During the month of July the Rosyth and West Fife Branch standard was called upon to attend the funerals of two Royal Navy veterans, whose funerals were held on the same day, Tuesday 18 July, at Dunfermline Crematorium.

The first, in the morning, was for John MacKinnon Beaton, who was born on 13 August 1923 at Ferrindonald, Isle of Skye, the second of three sons. On completing his primary school education, John and his family moved to the island of Islay, where John spent two years attending Port Ellen then Bowmore Secondary schools before moving to lodgings in Dunoon where he resumed his studies for Higher Certificates at the local Grammar School.

On the successful completion of his secondary education, John was accepted for a BSc degree course at Glasgow University.

Coming from a seafaring family – John's father was the Captain of the Islay mail boat MV Lochiel – he spent all of his holidays working with his father on the boat, honing his nautical skills.

In 1939, at the outset of World War 2, John had his calling to arms and joined the Royal Navy as an Ordinary Seaman, which meant that he was compelled to put his studies for a degree on hold.

His Naval career saw him serve on the Atlantic Convoys escorting merchant ships across the ocean. John admitted that service with the convoys was the most frightening and difficult parts of his service in the Royal Navy.

He also served with the Pacific Fleet aboard the aircraft carrier HMS Indefatigable, seeing action during the attacks on Japanese-held oil refineries on the island of Sumatra before Indefatigable joined the American forces, in March 1945, as they prepared to invade the island of Okinawa in Operation Iceberg.

Indefatigable later joined the American Fleet in the attack on the Japanese home islands in July and August.

On his discharge from the Royal Navy, John returned home to complete his degree and, following graduation, he took up employment as a teacher of Science and Maths, firstly at Dalmellington Secondary School and then Helensburgh Secondary School.

In recent years John, along with the few remaining survivors of the Russian Convoys, was presented, by the Russian Consulate in Scotland, with the Atlantic Convoys Medal. John had dearly hoped to take up the invitation by the Russian Consulate to make a visit to Moscow but alas, declining health, Covid and finally the invasion of Ukraine prevented this.

John married his sweetheart Jean McCallum in 1955 and in 1965 their daughter Sally was born. Sadly, Jean passed away in 1995.

In 2000 John moved to North Queensferry to live and became a very much-loved and respected member of that small community. He became very active in the community, baking meringue pies for his local church fetes, enthusiastically working with his local Probus, representing his local bowling club and indulging his love of sailing with the local boat club. John's talents also saw him

being interviewed by BBC Scotland in a piece entitled 'Scotsman brings new meaning to Bananas', following his success in cultivating a banana tree in his back garden.

The second funeral held later that morning was for former Royal Navy Wren Shipmate Catherine Black McIntosh.

Her family requested that her funeral be a quiet affair, attended by family and RNA Shipmates with no formal ceremony.

Catherine's husband Peter, also a member of the Rosyth and West Fife Branch, and who is not in very good health himself, was released from hospital for the funeral, and Shipmates were privileged to be able to chat with him before the service. Given the difficult circumstances he is enduring Peter was in good form and pleased to see them all.

There was an excellent turnout from the Branch – both funerals were attended by 12 Branch Members including President Shipmate Alan Bayliss. The Branch Standard along with the Standard of the British Legion were in attendance.

HMS Caledonia was well-represented by a Royal Marine
Bugler along with the First Lieutenant
of Caledonia, Lt Cdr Morgan
McDonald, PO George Larsen and
two Reservists from HMS Scotia.

Catherine's funeral was also attended by Submariner WO Stefano Mannucci from HMS Neptune, a long-time friend of Peter and his family.

#### > AUGUST SWINGING THE LAMP

#### 1 August 1861:

HMS Warrior, the world's first iron-hulled armour-plated warship was commissioned. The ship is now open to the public at Portsmouth Historic Dockyard.

#### 2 August 1917:

Lt Edwin Dunning RN became the first pilot to land an aircraft on the deck of a moving ship, taking off in a Sopwith Pup biplane from RNAS Smoogro and setting down on the flight deck of converted cruiser HMS Furious at Scapa Flow, Orkney. He relied on colleagues grabbing the plane as it descended to complete the landing (pictured in this Imperial War Museum image, © IWM Q 20637). Dunning, aged 25, made a second successful landing on the for'ard flight deck of Furious five days later, but died later the same day attempting a third landing.

#### 3 August 1901:

Pioneering warship HMS Viper grounded on rocks off Alderney and was abandoned shortly after. The 350-ton torpedo boat destroyer was the first warship in the world powered by steam turbines, making her also the fastest destroyer in the world, with an estimated top speed in excess of 35 knots, though her high rate of fuel consumption limited her potential, She was lost in late afternoon fog on the Renonquet Rocks during exercises, and was wrecked beyond repair the following day.

#### 4 August 1903:

Royal Naval College Osborne formally opened on the Isle of Wight by King Edward VII. Officer cadets joined as young teenagers and trained for two years before going on to Dartmouth. The college, which was part of the Osborne House estate so beloved by Queen Victoria, closed down in 1921.

#### 5 August 1914:

1,300-ton Laforey-class destroyer HMS Lance fired the first British shot of World War 1 when she challenged converted German pleasure steamer Konigin Luise, which was laying mines in the North Sea – see our entry for 6 August. The German ship was badly damaged by gunfire from Lance and other Royal Navy warships of her squadron, and either sank or was scuttled, with Lance picking up a couple of dozen survivors. The 4in gun that fired the first shot, currently on loan from the Imperial War Museum, is on display at the National Museum of the Royal Navy in Portsmouth Historic Dockyard.

#### 6 August 1914:

Light ('Scout') cruiser HMS Amphion became the first British warship sunk in action during World War 1 when she struck a mine laid by converted German pleasure steamer Konigin Luise off the Thames Estuary. Amphion had been leading the squadron which included destroyer HMS Lance, which fired on the German minelayer the previous day, and the cruiser had picked up a number of the German ship's crew when it sank. But on her return from a patrol off the Dutch coast, despite her captain steaming several miles west of where he believed the German mines had been laid, Amphion ran into one and sank in around 15 minutes, taking more then 130 British sailors – and an unknown number of survivors from Konigin Luise – with her.

#### 7 August 2005:

A Royal Navy-operated remotely-operated Scorpio submersible rescued seven Russian sailors who had been trapped more than 600ft deep in the Bering Sea when their own AS-28 Priz-class deep submergence rescue submersible became entangled in netting and cables. British, American and Japanese teams stepped forward to help, but the Royal Navy team took the lead and successfully cut the cables, releasing the Russian vessel and crew, who had less than six hours of air left.

#### 8 August 1968:

'Broad-beam' Leander-class frigate HMS Scylla was launched from No 3 Slip at Devonport – the last warship to be built at a Royal Dockyard.

#### 9 August 1952:

A North Korean Mig-15 jet was shot down by a Royal Navy Hawker Sea Fury during the Korean War – the first time a piston-engined aircraft beat a jet in combat. Four Sea Furies of 802 Naval Air Squadron, flying from HMS Ocean on a reconnaissance mission over Pyongyang, were attacked by the enemy jets, and at least one was brought down. The kill was originally credited to Lt Peter 'Hoagy' Carmichael, who himself credited it to the whole flight; later evidence suggested Sub Lt Brian 'Schmoo' Ellis may have been the pilot who shot down the Mig.

#### 10 August 1865:

Admiral of the Fleet Sir Francis Austen died at the age of 91 at his home in Widley, north of Portsmouth. The Naval officer was the elder brother of renowned novelist Jane Austen.

#### 11 August 1705:

Fourth rate HMS Plymouth foundered in a summer storm in the Channel with the loss of all hands. Originally built as a 52-gun frigate in 1653, she was rebuilt at Blackwall as a 60-gun fourth-rate in the same year that she was lost.

#### 12 August 1915:

A Short Type 84 biplane piloted by Flt Cdr Charles Edmonds, of the Royal Naval Air Service, became the first aircraft in the world to launch a successful aerial torpedo attack on an enemy ship. The aircraft, operating from seaplane carrier HMS Ben-my-Chree in the Aegean Sea, launched a 14in 370kg torpedo which sank a 5,200-ton Turkish supply ship in the Sea of Marmara.

#### 13 August 1762:

End of the Siege of Havana, a crucial element in the Seven Years War; a fine example of inter-Service co-operation that saw Havana – a major port and naval base in Spanish America – fall to a combined Anglo-American force transported by a Royal Navy flotilla. Imaginative tactics foiled the Spanish defences and delivered a Spanish fleet into British hands, weakening Spanish influence and strengthening Britain's grip on its colonies.

#### 14 August 1877:

Politician William Henry Smith – the 'Son' in newsagents WH Smith and Son – was appointed First Lord of the Admiralty by Prime Minister Benjamin Disraeli, causing some controversy as the businessman had never been to sea. In the event he proved an effective administrator, and later served twice as the Secretary of State for War.

#### 15 August 1945:

VJ Day – Victory over Japan Day – marked the formal end of World War 2 with the surrender of Imperial Japan. The American commemoration is on 2 September, which marks the day that the surrender document was signed on board American battleship USS Missouri in Tokyo Bay.

#### 16 August 1915:

The villages of Parton, Lowca and Low Moresby, near Whitehaven in Cumbria, were shelled for almost an hour by a German U-boat. A newspaper report noted that a few shells hit a railway embankment, slightly delaying train services, while fires were quickly put out in the villages, and no casualties were reported.

#### 17 August 1951:

The Royal Navy's first operational jet fighter squadron, 800 Naval Air Squadron, equipped with Supermarine Attackers, was formed at HMS Peregrine, RN Air Station Ford in West Sussex. None of the 146 Attacker aircraft, in three variants, produced for the FAA ever saw active service, and they were withdrawn from the front line during 1954.

#### 18 August 1951:

Fast Patrol Boat HMS Bold Pioneer, the first operational warship to be powered by gas turbine engines, was launched at the shipyard of J Samuel Whites of Cowes. The 150-ton experimental ship – one of a pair, the other (Bold Pathfinder) was launched a month later at Vospers in Portchester – was powered by two Metro-Vick gas turbines and had two Mercedes diesels for cruising, later replaced by Napier Deltics. She was actually launched with just diesels, as the turbines were not ready in time, and the two ships proved somewhat unreliable, but attained speeds of over 40 knots and paved the way for the dashing Brave-class attack boats.

#### 19 August 1915:

German battlecruiser Moltke was torpedoed by Royal Navy submarine HMS E1 during the Battle of the Gulf of Riga – believed to be the first such strike on a Dreadnought. The torpedo hit the warship's for'ard torpedo room, killing eight sailors and flooding some compartments, but Moltke survived and was repaired in Hamburg within a month.

#### 20 August 1896:

HMS Defiance, the last of the 'wooden wall' ships of the line built by the Royal Navy, played a leading role in communications development when she received the first RN wireless transmission. The ship, launched in 1861, was the Devonport torpedo and mines school ship at the time, and her commander, Capt Henry Jackson (later Admiral of the Fleet) was a wireless telegraphy pioneer, working closely with Marconi and developing his own experimental communications devices.

#### 21 August 1740:

Grog rum mixed with water – was introduced to the Royal Navy on the West Indies Station by Admiral Edward Vernon as a way of reducing drunkenness. By mixing the sailor's daily allowance of half a pint of rum with a quart of (often stagnant and unpalatable) water, it not only reduced the immediate effect of alcohol (the issue was also dished out in two stages, morning and evening) but also prevented the spirit being hoarded as the water caused it to spoil relatively quickly. Vernon was known as Old Grog because of the heavy grogram cloth coat he wore, and thus his nickname was also adopted for the adulterated rum ration.

#### 22 August 1918:

Battlecruiser HMS Hood was launched at the shipyard of John Brown on the Clyde. She was the largest warship in the world for some two decades, and steamed to ports around the world to fly the flag for the Royal Navy. The 'Mighty Hood' was sunk in a duel with Bismarck and Prinz Eugen during the Battle of the Denmark Strait on 24 May 1941, with all but three of her ship's company of 1,418 being lost – a significant blow to British morale, and one which brought swift retribution when a strong Royal Navy task force found and sank Bismarck three days later.

#### 23 August 1628:

Lord Admiral of the Navy George Villiers, the Duke of Buckingham – a favourite of King Charles I – was stabbed to death by John Felton, a disgruntled Army officer, at the Greyhound tavern in the High Street, Old Portsmouth. Buckingham was associated with several disastrous military expeditions and diplomatic failures, including a costly debacle at La Rochelle in France, which is thought to have triggered Fenton's plan to assassinate the nobleman.

#### 24 August 1867:

Eight-year-old Fanny Adams was brutally murdered in Alton, Hampshire, by Frederick Baker, who hanged for his crime on Christmas Eve the same year. A year or so later Royal Navy sailors were less than enthusiastic over the introduction of new rations of tinned mutton of variable quality, and through a macabre sense of humour these rations were dubbed 'Fanny Adams' as they were said to resemble the girl's remains. The large tin containers, which were often used as mess tins, and some larger cooking pots became known as Fannys.

#### 25 August 1553:

Believed to be the date on which King Henry VIII's flagship Henry Grace a Dieu, or the Great Harry, was accidentally destroyed by fire at Woolwich Dockyard on the Thames, very close to where she had been built almost 40 years earlier. The four-masted carrack, thought to have displaced well in excess of 1,000 tons, was a more powerful version of the Mary Rose but saw very little action, spending more of her time on diplomatic missions.

#### 26 August 1914:

Protected cruiser HMS Highflyer destroyed German armed merchant cruiser Kaiser Wilhelm de Grosse off Rio de Oro in Spanish Sahara, now the disputed territory of Western Sahara. The German ship had left Bremen just ten days before. The German commerce raider, originally built as a passenger liner, had been coaling in port when she was challenged by Highflyer, and having expended her ammunition in the ensuing action, and being unable to escape, she was scuttled by her crew.

#### 27 August 2010:

Submarine HMS Astute, the first of her class, was commissioned at Faslane in Scotland. Half as big again as the Trafalgar-class boats she replaced, the 7,400-ton vessel and her sisters are regarded as amongst the most advanced nuclear attack submarines in the world today.

#### 28 August 1967:

Royal Fleet Auxiliary tanker RFA Olynthus was renamed during a refit in Portsmouth. The ship's name was considered to be too close to that of HMS Olympus and liable to cause confusion, so on this day Olynthus became Olwen, a heroine in one of the 12th Century Welsh folk tales collected in the Mabinogion.

#### 29 August 1930:

Sloop HMS Harebell removed the last 36 inhabitants of the wind-lashed island of St Kilda, 40 miles out into the Atlantic from Benbecula. Life on the remote island, which suffered regular storms and gales, had become intolerable for the islanders and they requested the move – ironically, the morning of the evacuation was a perfect summer's day, with calm sparkling seas and blue cloudless skies.

#### 30 August 1954:

The Royal Naval Association, formed four years previously, received its original Royal Charter from Queen Elizabeth II.

#### 31 August 1962:

Cruiser HMS Blake, and frigates HM Ships Ulster and Whirlwind were on hand to participate in ceremonies marking the independence of Trinidad and Tobago, the most southerly nation in the Caribbean, just seven miles off the coast of Venezuela.
