Dear Shipmates,


So to next year, and we will be making the most of the 40th anniversary of the Falklands Conflict with the Conference weekend taking place in Portsmouth over the immediate weekend after the end of the conflict, 17-19 June. The 3 days of the weekend will be designated "Reunite (Fri), Relive (Sat) and Remember (Sun)."

On the Friday, I'm seeking to exploit the opportunity the Special Interest Groups have afforded us with a golf match, fishing, cycle ride out, classic cars drive out and m/c riders out doing their thing too. We have also been challenged to a cricket match by our sister (or rather brother!) organisation, the Royal Marines Association, on the cricket ground at Burnaby Road. I am looking therefore for a team captain and volunteers to make up the team and, remember, they are getting on a bit too so don't be put off if it's been a while since you last bowled a googly - we're keen to hear from you please. Clearly, we'll be wanting a strong support for that match too, so, if your not quite up to playing, consider yourself already selected for the supporting team.

This will be an important commemorative event and I am conscious that we now have a ratio of 5.3:1 Falklands vets v WWII. And, while we revere and venerate the sacrifices that amazing generation made to maintain our freedoms, by shifting the focus of our commemoration to the Falklands, it makes the commemoration piece that much more relevant to our current membership. I'm also conscious however that these may be difficult memories for some, and we will have trained support available that weekend (and thereafter) for anyone who feels they might benefit.

That ratio is growing by the day as some ships Associations are now joining the RNA as Branches in their own right. The RNA isn't on some takeover bid for smaller Associations. indeed, it is our strong belief that camaraderie is better achieved in smaller groups, especially if you have been in a conflict together. But with RNA permanent staff and a secure server it means that ships' associations membership data can be stored safely and accessed by Branch Secretaries when required without breaching any data protection legislation. A spin off advantage is the connection to the RNA comms (take it or leave it) which connects us across a wider Naval family. All ship's associations are welcome, not just the class of 1982.

Finally, heartiest congrats to Leading Photographer Lee Blease who I had the very great pleasure of meeting in Cleethorpes RNA recently for winning the Royal Naval Association Prize at the recent Peregrine Trophy photograph awards for this outstanding image of a very smart RNA Standard Bearer.

1. X Scams and Frauds Reminder

As the festive season is fast approaching, Shipmates will be thinking about how they're going to spend Christmas and what they need to do to prepare for the big day and celebrations over the break.



But please see below a gentle reminder concerning the variety of Scams and Frauds that unscrupulous folk use.

Refund scams - You may receive an email or text pretending to be from the council or other organisation promising a credit or tax refund and a link to click to claim the money back. They'll ask for bank details – don't give them.

Look-a-like websites - This year, more than any, we are buying presents online. Criminals sometimes set up fake websites that look identical to steal personal details and money. Secure website addresses start with 'https' and display a padlock.

Phishing emails - Criminals send emails that look genuine to make you click on a link or open an attachment that infects your machine with a virus. Think before clicking.

Phone scams – Criminals ring to discuss a topic and ask you to press a number on your phone. Don't – it will generate huge charges which the criminals will profit from.

Gift card scams - Received an email from a friend asking you to buy gift cards for them? Criminals pretend to be people you know to get you to do this. They are after the code on the card to spend the money.

Fake delivery notifications - Over December you may have many packages being delivered. Criminals are sending chance phishing emails disguised as well-known couriers and hoping to get you to log in and share you details. If you are in doubt, ignore the email and get in contact via the company's official secure website.

Covid-19 scams - Received a letter from the council identifying you as a contact of a confirmed case of Covid-19? The council will provide advice about self-isolation and how to book a coronavirus test. They won't ask for personal details.

Fake charities - Watch out for criminals using legitimate charity names to appeal for a donation. Ask to see their official charity ID which they are required to carry. Trust your instinct.

E-card scams - Watch for those e-cards you receive online. It could be infected with a virus that could shut down your device and you could be held to ransom to restore files. Get anti-virus software installed to alert you.

Shopping scams - Love top brands with low prices? Stay vigilant for counterfeit goods. These range from poorly made clothes to dangerous electronics which fail to comply with safety laws. If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

Fraudsters use all sorts of methods to target victims – knocking on doors, by phone, sending letters or online. Always be alert and take your time when considering something. Don't allow anyone to rush you, make sure you know who you are dealing with, and don't be afraid to shut the door, hang up, bin it and delete it. Don't let criminals ruin your Christmas.

If you are the victim of a scam, report it to **Action Fraud** or for more advice about cyber security, visit the **National Cyber Security Centre**.

Friday - Reunite

Friday sees Special Interest Groups and other Shipmates reuniting for a 1900 Beating Retreat at the steps of the Guildhall, followed by a civic function in the Guildhall for invited Falklands

Veterans, and an evening RNA dinner in the HMS Nelson Wardroom, garden marquee for the majority.

Sunday – Remember

On the Sunday, in Old Portsmouth, those related to the Naval Service are invited to march with their Shipmates with the RNA National, Area and Branch Standards for a 1100 Service of Remembrance at the Falklands monument, followed by the City of Portsmouth unveiling a new memorial, and presenting the RNA, RMA and Falklands Veterans with Freedom of the City scrolls. Commemorations will conclude with a short service, and civic refreshments in Portsmouth Cathedral.


11. 🖈 Hackney's Crucial Part in 'Operation Mincemeat'

Our thanks to Martin Sugarman for forwarding the very interesting article below concerning the Second World War deception plan 'Operation Mincemeat'.....


A plaque commemorating a WW2 secret deception plan, "Operation Mincemeat", has been erected outside Hackney Mortuary, remembering the saving of thousands of American and British military lives.

In Spring 1943, almost exactly 78 years ago, the British and American Allies began planning to invade Sicily, the first liberation of part of mainland Europe from Nazi Occupation. Heavy Allied casualties were expected.

A Jewish barrister, Commander Ewen Montagu, OBE, KC, RNVR and a wealthy aristocrat, Flight Lt. Charles







From here, with only the submarine officers knowing what was in the container, the body was taken to near the coast of Spain. It was then floated into the sea at a spot where it was known that the current would wash it ashore near the coastal town of Huelva. Here it was discovered, as expected, and the local Spanish authorities, as sympathisers with the Nazis, ensured the

local Nazi spies saw the contents; they then photographed the letters, and sent the documents to Berlin.

Thus it was that many German soldiers, tanks, aircraft and much artillery were sent to Greece from both Italy and Sicily, resulting in far fewer casualties when the Allies ultimately landed in Sicily on 9th July 1943

The story was recounted in Montagu's 1953 book, 'The Man Who Never Was' and a film (1956) was later made with Montagu playing a small cameo role in one scene; the full story with true names and many details, could not, however, be told in the book and film owing to The Official Secrets Act, but Ben MacIntyre's book, 'Mincemeat' published in 2010 was able at last to tell all.

The Hackney plaque was financed by Jerry Klinger of the Jewish American Society for Historic Preservation, UK branch, with the initiative of Martin Sugarman and the Hackney and Stamford Hill Association of Jewish Ex-Servicemen and Women - AJEX - of the UK, and assisted by Hackney Council and St John at Hackney Church. A ceremony of official unveiling is planned in the future.



12. RNA Bench – Normandy Memorial Trust

Shipmates will be aware that last year the RNA donated a bench to be sited at the British Normandy Memorial and Julie Verne from the Trust has very kindly sent some photos. One of the photos shows where the bench is sited, next to the entrance, and its magnificent view. The Trust are concerned by how quickly the brass plaque had tarnished from the sea air, and they will seek to replace them with marine grade stainless steel.







13. ★ Weather Person Joke

Shipmates may be aware that the Royal British Legion are hold a Falklands Campaign 40th Anniversary commemoration service at the National Memorial Arboretum on 14 June 2022.

The programme for the day will feature Associations holding their own commemoration at their individual memorials and in the afternoon join together for a secular service and interactive ceremony featuring Falkland Campaign veterans both military and civilian at the National Memorial in the centre of the NMA. The ceremony at 1400 will also feature a direct link-up with Port Stanley. The event will be hosted by Max Hastings. There will also be an exhibition hall for attendees to visit and reminisce

The day is aimed primarily at Veterans and their spouses and bereaved families, not Senior Government and Service VIPs, obviously some senior figures will attend in their own right as a Falklands veteran.

It is estimated some 10,000 tickets will be available and details will be released early in the new year. The RBL are currently negotiating with Network Rail to investigate the possibility of free travel, fingers crossed!

Finally, as stated previously the service will feature Veterans and their families telling their stories of the campaign. It does not need historical factual descriptions, although are definitely welcome but some of the lighter personal relocations. 18. ★ The Trafalgar Way – Raising Funds for the Sea Cadets

The Trafalgar Way issues a long-distance 'virtual' challenge to walkers and runners around the world in support of Sea Cadets

Could you walk or run 271 miles in ten months? Whether you are a reluctant exerciser or cardio enthusiast, if you're considering a motivational fitness challenge for the year ahead then you may wish to consider entering The Trafalgar Way's End-to-End virtual event, in association with Sea Cadets (https://www.sea-cadets.org).

The Trafalgar Way project (www.thetrafalgarway.org) promotes the story behind the Naval Officer, Lt John Richards Lapenotiere, who in 1805 returned to London carrying the official news from the Battle of Trafalgar - news which stunned the nation. His important message of victory and tragedy, informing the world of the death of Vice Admiral Lord Nelson, had to be personally delivered. It involved a perilous journey at sea over 9 days, followed by a harrowing non-stop

chase from Falmouth to the Admiralty in London, racing to deliver the news before a rival naval officer.

Many in the naval community will be familiar with the growing tradition of holding November 'Pickle Nights' as an alternative to the more formal Trafalgar Dinners held in late October. HMS Pickle was the name of the naval schooner which carried home to British shores the official dispatches from Vice Admiral Collingwood stationed off Cape Trafalgar - and Lt Lapenotiere was her commanding officer. His ensuing land journey from Falmouth in a post-chaise-and-four express coach service covered 271 rugged miles, which he completed in under 38 hours, scarcely pausing on his journey except for essential stops to change horses.

Speaking on behalf of the charity The 1805 Club (www.1805club.org) who promote and care for The Trafalgar Way, project coordinator Kathy Brown explains how their 2022 challenge works. "Over the lockdown period, many runners and walkers have turned to virtual events such as 'Lands End to John O'Groats (LEJOG)' to keep them motivated and occupied. With these events there's no need to run along the *real* route, you do it wherever you like and the experience is mapped for you onto a virtual representation of the journey. Drawing on this increasingly popular activity, we have teamed up with experienced online virtual platform, End to End Run, to create this year-long initiative which will support the charities behind The Trafalgar Way and Sea Cadets. In a way, you could say we are championing the maritime past and future in one go. Now we'd like more serving, reserve and retired Royal Naval and Royal Marines personnel to take up the challenge and have a go, too!"

Today, the 271-mile route of The Trafalgar Way passes through 8 modern English counties. What was once a series of rutted turnpikes and toll-roads is today a set of busy A-roads and tiny country lanes, often without pavements; too dangerous to stage a real-world event, but perfect for mapping a 'virtual' one. Participants can take part from anywhere in the world, log their runs and walks online, and see their progress along an interactive map. As they reach certain milestones of the journey, participants receive electronic 'postcards' giving them historic information about the original journey, the places on the route and other things of interest. It's a novel way to learn a bit of history while keeping fit out of doors.

Kathy is undertaking the challenge in her own right. "I'm a keen casual runner and having a goal to work towards is always a good thing. We've set up this challenge to appeal to walkers, runners and wheelchair users of all ages and abilities. If you can cover 5 to 10 miles a week, you'll manage to 'reach' the Admiralty in under a year, and hopefully have a bit of fun along the way!"

"This challenge is open to everyone, and we especially hope to see Sea Cadets and their families and supporters, plus members of the RN and RM communities whether serving, volunteer or retired, taking it on.

The challenge went live on November 4th 2021 and participants need to complete the distance by 'Pickle Night' November 6th 2022 in order to claim the exclusive tee-shirt and medal recognising their achievement. There is no obligation to raise funds on top of the entry fee of £29.99, but entrants can opt to use the challenge to fundraise for their own causes if they wish.

1st	1941	Light cruisers <i>Aurora</i> and <i>Penelope</i> , and destroyer <i>Lively</i> sank the Italian destroyer <i>Alvise da Mosto</i> off Kerkenah Bank (33.45N,
2 nd	1796	Southampton captured the Spanish privateer Corso off Cape delle Mele.
3rd	1993	<i>Nurton</i> , the last of 118 original Ton-class MCMVs, which had been converted for service in the Northern Ireland Patrol Squadron, and the Royal Navy's last wooden seagoing ship, entered Portsmouth to pay off.
4 th	1827	The first steam vessels commissioned as HM ships; the Duke of Clarence, Lord High Admiral, signed commissions for Lt George Evans, G.J. Hay and T. Bullock to command <i>Lighting</i> , <i>Echo</i> and <i>Meteor</i> . The ships appeared in <i>The Navy List</i> next month.
5 th	1969	Chinese Unofficials. 'Tailors, Cobblers and Barbers are not to be mployed in HM ships west of Suez. The only Chinese Unofficials who may be brought west of Suez are Laundrymen and may not remain west of Suez for more than 12 months. When in Home Waters Laundrymen are not to work as Tailors, Cobblers or Barbers.' – DCI(RN) 1511/69.
6 th	1954	The former royal yacht <i>Victoria and Albert</i> arrived at Faslane for breaking up. Following custom, coins of the realm had been placed beneath her three masts during construction at Pembroke

		Dockyard. These were recovered; all are dated 1899, the year of her launch.
7th	1817	William Bligh, Vice-Admiral of the Blue, late Captain of HM Armed Transport <i>Bounty</i> , of <i>Director</i> (64) at the Battle of Camperdown and of <i>Glatton</i> (56) at Copenhagen, died at Lambeth. Buried in churchyard of St Mary, Lambeth, now the Museum of Garden History.
8th	1778	Horatio Nelson promoted master and commander into the brig Badger.
9th	1942	Destroyer <i>Porcupine</i> torpedoed by U-602 off Cape Ferrat (36.40N, 00.04W). Reached Gibraltar and towed to UK in two parts nicknamed <i>Pork</i> and <i>Pine</i> . But CTL, so no second <i>Zubian</i>
10th	2008	Daring, f irst of the Type 45 destroyers, accepted from her builders, BVT Surface Fleet Ltd, at Scotstoun by Capt Paul Bennett RN and White Ensign hoisted. Ship is affiliated with Birmingham and Guernsey
11 th	1807	Grasshopper captured the Spanish San Jose under Cape Negrete.
12th	1936	Destroyer <i>Fury</i> , escorted by destroyer <i>Wolfhound</i> , carried Prince Edward (later Duke of Windsor) to France after his abdication as King Edward VIII the previous day.
13 th	1711	The wall around Portsmouth Dockyard completed. 'This WALL was Begun the 4th June and finish'd ye 13th Decembr 1711.' 'In order to meet the needs of modern road traffic and with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty this gate built in 1711 was increased in width from 12ft to 22ft, November 1944' – plaques at Victory Gate.
14 th	1809	Defender, gun-brig of fourteen guns, Lt John George Nops RN, sailing from the Downs to Spithead, anchored off Folkestone to avoid a gale, wrecked on Cob Point when both her anchor cables parted. Crew saved.
15 th	1805	The body of Vice-Admiral Viscount Nelson, preserved in a cask of spirits after Trafalgar, transferred into an elm coffin on board <i>Victory</i> at anchor off Dover while on passage from Portsmouth to The Nore. On 21 December, Mr Whitby, Master Attendant at Woolwich, and Mr Tyson, Nelson's former secretary, arrived at Sheerness with the 'exterior coffin'.
16 th	1921	Victory, first rate, moved into No. 1 Basin, Portsmouth Dockyard; the first move towards her restoration and preservation
17th	1941	Blankney, Exmoor, Penstemon, Stanley, Stork and Martlet aircraft of 802 Sqn (Audacity) sank U-131 W. of Gibraltar (34.12N, 13.35W). Convoy HG 76. Cdr F.J. Walker's first kill, with 36th Escort Group.
18th	1827	Uniforms for officers reduced to a double-breasted coat, always to be buttoned up, with gold laced trousers for dress wear and plain for undress (white in summer). Breeches and dress swords restricted to Drawing Room. Buttons to be slightly domed rather than flat.
19th	1963	Assault ship <i>Fearless</i> launched at Harland & Wolff, Belfast, by Lady Hull, wife of Gen. Sir Richard Hull. Vice-Admiral J.B. Frewen,

		VCNS, and Lt-Gen. Sir Malcolm Cartwright- Taylor, CGRM, were present. The media were ordered not to photograph the stern of the ship, a security attempt negated by a Soviet merchant ship alongside at an adjacent berth.
20th	1808	The Royal Navy's second <i>Dauntless</i> , an 18-gun ship sloop, launched at Deptford Dockyard. She served in seas as far apart as Archangel, Newfoundland and the East Indies but, unlike the first of the name, she stayed out of trouble and was sold in 1825.
21st	1941	Escort carrier <i>Audacity</i> sunk by U-751 500 miles W. of Cape Finisterre (44.00N, 20.00W), and <i>Deptford</i> and <i>Samphire</i> sank U-567 in Atlantic (44.02N, 20.10W). Convoy HG 76.
22 nd	1875	Goliath, former 80-gun second rate, reduced to training ship 'for pauper boys from workhouses', accidentally burned out in Medway.
23 rd	1796	Minerve captured the French privateer Maria 30 miles S.W. by W. of Cape Spartivento, Sardinia
24 th	1798	Rear-Admiral Sir Horatio Nelson, having precipitated a French attack on Naples, embarked the Sicilian royal family in <i>Vanguard</i> (74) and sailed for Palermo, the second capital of the Kingdom of the Two Sicilies.
25 th	1965	The 500th day of patrol work by the Royal Navy in Malaysian waters since the start of Indonesian 'Confrontation'. During 1965 British warships steamed 1 million miles and killed or captured 1,400 Indonesian raiders for the loss of two officers killed and eleven men injured.
26 th	1944	Frigate <i>Capel</i> sunk by U-486 off Cape de la Hogue, Normandy (49.50N, 01.41W): capsized slowly. <i>Affleck</i> also torpedoed by U-486; made her way home but CTL.
27 th	1831	Beagle sailed on five-year circumnavigation carrying Charles Darwin, subsequently author of On the Origin of Species.
28 th	1975	Third Cod War. The first collision of the 'War' between Icelandic Gunboat Thor and frigate Andromeda; fifty-six collisions were to follow, many severe enough to force the frigates to return to the UK.
29th	1860	Warrior, f irst British seagoing ironclad, launched at Blackwall. Became tender to Vernon, reduced to fuelling hulk at Pembroke Dock and subsequently restored at Hartlepool. Returned to Portsmouth as 'Warrior 1860' on 16 June 1987.
30 th	1941	Light cruiser Ajax and river gunboat Aphis bombarded Bardia.
31st	1915	RNR and RNVR officers to wear gold lace, and not braid, but narrower stripes than RN.
