Message from the National President -

Shipmate, Duncan L Potts CB, Vice Admiral (Retd)

When Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth, our Patron, died on 8th September I think we were all shocked. It was not just that 48 hours beforehand she had been receiving the new Prime Minister, but it was also the shock of the strength of our collective national feeling of loss. I can only speak for myself, but my reaction was one of shock, sadness and loss.

Although I had met The Queen more than most - she in many ways book-ended my career, taking my passing out parade at Dartmouth and I had a private lunch with her the year I retired, with a couple of other events in between - I could not claim to know Her Majesty. But as for all of us, she had been the constant, reassuring presence in our lives. She embodied so many of the qualities we like to think are the backbone of our national culture: service; selflessness; modesty; understated; an even, calm presence; and a rallying figure we could all rely on in good times and bad.



The extraordinary 11 days of mourning seemed to show that we still respected and in many ways yearned for the qualities she demonstrated every day for 70 years. Like you I followed the period of mourning closely and think as a country we rediscovered things about our collective selves that we thought had slipped away. The number of people who wanted to pay their respects and the bonding of strangers queuing together showed that the silent majority is still not as the shrill voices in society would have you believe.



I was also struck that what Her Majesty stood for was everything we do in the RNA: service, camaraderie, concern for others, and a belief in society; our Patron and our Association had so much in common. Consequently, I was deeply honoured and privileged to represent you all at the State Funeral. It was a wonderful and very moving service and I will never forget the fading piper that ended the Service. I missed the procession live, but felt very proud to see our National Standard Bearer performing immaculately

on the Global Stage; our Standard played a very prominent role; BZ Steve Champion, you certainly lived up to your name.

Finally, I would like to reassure you that Bill Oliphant and I have already started the process of securing our new Patron. We are shooting high, God Save The King.



5. ★ Project Semaphore - iPads (RNA/Armed Forces Covenant Trust Fund Project)

Have you heard of Project Semaphore?... No... Let me enlighten you!

For a number of years, the RNA has been supported by the Armed Forces Covenant Trust Fund and its predecessor, and was awarded funding to support Tri Service veterans out of digital isolation, to reduce loneliness and social isolation and to ensure that veterans have access to online support and services that some people take for granted.

The project provides eligible veterans with an RNA branded iPad and protective case for their personal use. The iPads can be used to connect with friends, family and shipmates, general interest purposes, to undertake hobbies through the use of technology, online shopping, paying bills and utilities online and a variety of other uses.

In 2018 Age UK produced a report of the impact of digital exclusion in the elderly, the report outlined that those without access to a smart phone, tablet or computer were potentially £1000 per year worse off. The reason being that you are often able to save money on various things, if you purchase or pay for services on-line. For those without a digital device this is not possible and leaves you at not only a financial disadvantage but a social one to.



I appreciate that those who may not be used to digital technology may be apprehensive to use an iPad, that's why we have a network of volunteers and supporters, who are able to support you through the process, from receiving your iPad and setting it up, to staying safe online and ensuring you get the best out of your device, as well as training and support calls/live sessions.

Having an iPad can do a lot for you. It can increase access to books, news articles, and videos, you can learn and enjoy your favourite entertainment. There are never-ending puzzles and games to keep your mind active and having fun. An iPad keeps its users engaged in what they enjoy and communicating with loved ones at home or anywhere they take the portable device. iPads can be adjusted according to the user's abilities and their preferences, so really, there is a way to set an iPad up perfectly for anyone based on needs and or abilities.

If you want to apply to become a recipient of Project Semaphore, or apply on someone else's behalf, firstly you will need to complete an application form, to do this, please click the button below or click [HERE](#):



Once the application form has been received this will be reviewed by Gemma Swanson, Project Lead. If your application is successful Gemma will be in contact to arrange delivery of your iPad.

Where possible, we will arrange for a volunteer to come to visit you in your home to assist you in setting up the iPad to suit your needs, if there is not one available, we may be able to do this over the phone prior to you receiving your iPad. If there are specific interests or Apps you would like on the iPad, please speak with Gemma and we may be able to add these prior to you receiving your iPad.

As the iPad is for your sole use, RNA colleagues do not have any remote access to the device so if there are any issues, these can be addressed in a number of ways, either, face to face, over the phone or by sending the device back to us.

You are welcome to keep the iPad for as long as you want or need it. However, we ask that you do not pass the device on to friends or family to use and if you no longer require it or, you purchase a tablet or computer yourself, the device will need to be returned to us, to ensure that those in need have an opportunity to benefit from the project.

Support for Project Semaphore

For project Semaphore to be successful, we rely on a network of volunteers to support our beneficiaries... And we always need more.

Volunteering on the project requires a good level of technical understanding and you will be required to travel to peoples homes to support them with their device if problems should arise.

A project Semaphore Volunteer supports with the setting up of the device once the beneficiary receives it. Understanding Apple ID's and how to create an account, working through and installing any Apps that the beneficiary requires, creating email accounts, and supporting with any questions they may have on how to do things.

7. ★ Office of Veterans' Affairs – Stand By for the Veterans' Survey coming soon



The Director of the Office for Veterans' Affairs, Jessie Owen has written to inform Veterans that a UK-wide Veterans Survey will be launched shortly. He explained that hearing from the veteran community is vital and that is why the government will be launching

the Veterans' Survey this Autumn.

This is the first ever exercise to collect feedback from the veteran community across the UK coordinated by the Office for Veterans' Affairs and the Office for National Statistics. Responses to the survey will help us better understand the experiences, needs and wellbeing of the veteran community, and guide future action.

It is important we hear a wide range of views and we would like to encourage as many ex-UK Armed Forces veterans and their families to share feedback. The survey will be live for 12 weeks from November. The exact date will be released shortly.

10. ★ Governance 'Stuff' Update

Head of Governance, Shipmate Nick Purkis has recently advised a Shipmate on the requirement to hold Zoom/Teams by Area or Branches. Please see S/M Nick's comments below –

In relation to virtual meetings, there is no requirement for Areas (or Branches) to hold physical meetings. Indeed, last Friday the AMC held its meeting via Zoom. National Council, the AMC and the FAC, all hold half of their meetings virtually and the other half physically. There is no

prescription in the Charter, Rules or Bye-Laws as to the format of meetings. Whilst physical meetings are desirable, the National Council recommends a mixture of physical and virtual meetings, to reduce expenses and make the meetings more accessible for everyone.

The rules that were suspended by the National Council during lockdown, was the requirement to hold an AGM and file annual returns. At the start of lockdown, Zoom meetings were not widely accessible nor understood, however this is no longer the case.

On the point of the composition of Branch Committees, Bye-Law A4 states that Area Committee members are elected from amongst the Branch members. Therefore a member who resigns from a Branch and moves to the HQ Roll, is no longer allowed to attend Area meetings (unless invited as an observer) or hold office within an Area Committee.

After the shock of learning of the death of Her Majesty The Queen, it is difficult to believe that such a constant in our lives is no longer physically with us, but as the sad news finally sinks in, it has given me an opportunity to reflect on some of the qualities we will all miss.

Many years ago I had the honour and privilege of serving onboard HMY BRITANNIA. It was her kindness and mischievous sense of humour which stood out for me and have helped lighten the loss.

As Balmoral was somewhere The Queen reportedly "left her crown at the palace gates" similarly on BRITANNIA when on annual cruises around the Western Isles she visibly relaxed, knowing she was in safe and loyal hands surrounded by family and far from press intrusion.

One evening, The Queen held a reception in the Pool of London. As she came onboard she noticed that my right hand was in plaster and asked what had happened. I explained that I had broken it playing rugby against the Queen's Flight. A little later I was approached by The Queen's Equerry Major Hugh Lindsay. He said that The Queen wished to see me. "What had I done wrong?" was my immediate thought. I noticed that she was talking to a red-headed giant who towered over her and that his right arm was in plaster and in a sling. With that wonderful smile of hers and a twinkle in her eyes, she said that she thought we would like to meet and was further amused as we shook our left hands. The giant



was none other than my all-time rugby hero, the former England International Maurice Colclough, who I had watched live in Paris in 1980 when, after years in the wilderness, we won the Grand Slam. Despite the crowded reception and with so many guests present, she made the effort to introduce us knowing I would have been unlikely to have met him without her.

A further example occurred when in 1984 a million-strong crowd converged on the banks of the Mersey to witness the Parade of Sail of 70 Tall Ships. The Queen was able to enjoy a unique view from BRITANNIA, moored off Liverpool's Alexandra Dock.

That evening, The Queen was informed that we were about to overhaul the Russian four-masted Kruzenshtern, the world's second largest sail training ship. At the time, the embarked Royal Marine band was entertaining Her Majesty with trad jazz. On hearing that we were nearing this legendary barque, The Queen asked for the doors to be opened and so on that balmy evening the ragtime rhythms of "Hold That Tiger" wafted over the water. For the Russians it must have summed up all that they had been told about the decadent West!

13. ★ Naval Children's Charity - Update

How do you explain the trickier parts of life to a young child?

[The death of Her Majesty, The Queen](#) earlier this month got me thinking about young people and grief.

Her Majesty was very important to a lot of young people - especially those associated with the Royal Navy.

It might also bring up feelings about lost loved ones closer to home, especially if a relative is unwell or has recently died.

Resources that can help adults explain difficult emotions and concepts are so valuable. We have recently developed two booklets to support children and young people and their parents and carers when a parent dies. These will be on our website soon.

[We're also partnering with Thinkably](#), an online resource bank of e-books and other materials, that can help parents, guardians and teachers help children through some of life's big questions and challenges. Naval families will be able to access this library for free for the next 12 months.

One of the topics they cover, 'Tech Anxiety', has been a focus of ours over the past few months. We found there was a significant gap in understanding how serving families use social media during periods of deployment.

We've commissioned the Anglia Ruskin University's Veterans & Family Institute to look at this in more detail, in particular the differences in how parents and children use instant messaging, some of the limitations in internet based communications and how this is impacting children's emotional wellbeing.




The City of Glasgow RNA were contacted by the family of Francis Kelly, a US Medal of Honor recipient with a view to laying up the flag that covered his coffin with a museum. S/M Kenn McKinnon chairman of the branch made arrangements with the Armed Forces Veterans Association to receive it at their museum in Dumbarton Central Station, room 2 on platform 2.

On the 20th of September Graham Houston great grandson, Mary Houston great grand daughter, Marilyn McDermot great grand daughter and David Houston great great grandson handed the flag over to Tony Barr and Hugh Doohan of the Veterans Center.



Francis Kelly was born **Archibald Houston** in Anderston, Glasgow, Scotland. He enlisted in the US Navy from Massachusetts, and served as a 'watertenderin' the collier USS *Merrimac* during the Spanish–American War. Kelly was one of eight volunteer crew members when Rear Admiral William T Sampson ordered *Merrimac* sunk to block the entrance of Santiago Harbor, Cuba. On the night of 2-June 3, 1898, during the attempt to execute this mission, *Merrimac's* steering gear was disabled by enemy gunfire, and she sank without obstructing navigation. Her crewmen were rescued by the Spanish and made prisoners-of-war. After the Battle of Santiago de Cuba destroyed the Spanish fleet a month later, Kelly and his shipmates were released. For his actions during this operation, he was awarded the Medal of Honor.

Francis Kelly remained in the Navy after the Spanish–American War, ultimately obtaining the rank of Chief Machinists Mate. He returned home to Glasgow, and died there in 1938, his death certificate states "Archibald Houston (formerly Francis Kelly), US naval pensioner". He is buried at Sandymount Cemetery, Glasgow, Scotland.

His Citation to be awarded the Medal of Honor read as follows:

In connection with the sinking of the U.S.S. Merrimac at the entrance to the harbour of Santiago de Cuba, June 2, 1898. Despite heavy fire from the Spanish batteries, KELLY displayed extraordinary heroism throughout this operation.

North Tyneside Anthea Redfern, the Lord High Sherrif, and Deputy Lord Lieutenant of Northumberland represented by an RN Commander (retired) who had served for 38 years at HMS Calliope RNR depot on Tyneside.



The statue of a fisherman sitting was erected thanks to the local council and Henry Sims father, the money being raised from the two communities in less than a 6 month period. A bell ringing ceremony was performed as the names of the crew members were read out individually. A scale model of the ship was also on display. Refreshments after the service were provided at the Low Lights Heritage Centre nearby. There was also some entertainment laid on by a group called Beeswing, who sang some sea shantys.

The service was organised by the Fisherman's mission in North Shields who had arranged for a bus trip of 50 from the Hull area to attend the service which was conducted by Supt. Peter Dade the Area Officer, assisted by Brian Chambers the Secretary of the commission and a member of retired fishermen.





His final ship was HMS Intrepid and promotion to QMS and after "Intrepid" and was stationed at RMB Eastney and in 1974 became WO2.

After active service, John joined the RN&RM careers office in Hanley where he served for 15 years until his retirement in 1989 and whilst still employed by the Careers Service joined the RNA in 1983. He was an active member of the Branch eventually becoming President.

He will be immensely missed by his family and all who knew him.

Date	Year	Entry
1 st	1988	Hard-lying money replaced by long service at sea bonus.
2 nd	1804	Abortive attack with Fulton's fireships off Boulogne by Keith, which Gambier considered 'a horrible and anti-Christian mode of warfare'.
3 rd	1943	Battle of Termoli, Adriatic Coast. Amphibious operation by 40 Cdo RM to seize port and strategic road ahead of advancing forces. One DSO, three MCs, two MMs.

4 th	1982	Leander-class frigate <i>Bacchante</i> , transferred to RNZN on 1 October, commissioned as HMNZS <i>Wellington</i> . DCI(RN) 434/82.
5 th	2004	The submarine HMCS <i>Chicoutimi</i> (ex-HMS <i>Upholder</i>) running opened up on the surface in heavy seas in the E. Atlantic, was seriously damaged by a fire when she took in water through the open upper lid which arced the main power cables between the forward battery and the main propulsion switchboards. One officer died. <i>Chicoutimi</i> lost all power on board and drifted for sixty hours. She was towed 220 miles to Faslane, escorted by the frigate <i>Montrose</i> , and arrived on 10 October. Order of St John: Surg-Lt Michael Lindsay RN.
6 th	1901	Queen Alexandra became Patron of the Naval Nursing Service, which was renamed Queen Alexandra's Royal Naval Nursing Service.
7 th	2001	RN SSNs launched TLAMs at Taleban and al-Qaeda locations inside Afghanistan
8 th	1914	The second RN air attack from Antwerp on airship sheds at Dusseldorf and Cologne; Sqn Cdr D.A.S. Grey and Ft-Lt R.L.G. Marix, flying Sopwith Tabloids. Grey failed to find the target at Cologne due to fog and, under heavy rifle and shell fire, bombed the main railway station. Marix blew up the airship shed at Dusseldorf with the new rigid airship Z9, the first Zeppelin destroyed by a British aircraft. He ran out of petrol on the way back and returned to base on a borrowed bicycle. The base at Antwerp was overrun by the Germans that night and the naval crews destroyed their aircraft before withdrawing.
9 th	1862	VC: AB George Hinckley (<i>Sphinx</i>) for twice covering 150yd of ground under enemy fire to rescue wounded men. British and French landing parties, assisted by Chinese troops, repulsed the Taiping rebels and captured the city of Fung Wha, above Ningpo.
10 th	1946	Torpedo and Anti-Submarine (TAS) Branch formed: Torpedo Branch passed electrical responsibilities to the recently formed Electrical Branch and amalgamated with the Anti-Submarine Branch, formerly based at <i>Osprey</i> , Portland, to form the new TAS Branch based at <i>Vernon</i> .
11 th	1940	Battleship <i>Revenge</i> , seven destroyers and six MTBs bombarded Cherbourg. Covering force: cruisers <i>Cardiff</i> , <i>Emerald</i> , <i>Newcastle</i> and six destroyers. Operation Medium.
12 th	1940	Operation Sealion, the planned German invasion of Britain, postponed until spring 1941. 'Had Hitler been able to dominate the English Channel – be it only for twenty-four hours – he might have succeeded. But like Napoleon before him, he was never in a position to do so' – Vice-Admiral Friedrich Ruge.
13 th	1996	<i>Scott</i> , the biggest surveying ship ever built for the Royal Navy, launched at Appledore by Mrs Portillo. Vessel ordered to replace <i>Hecla</i> . Designed to commercial standards and provides deep bathymetric capability off the Continental Shelf. Her multibeam sonar suite permits mapping of the ocean floor. Full load displacement 13,550 tons. Ship's company of sixty-three divided into three watches, only two of which embarked.
14 th	1965	801 NAS at RNAS Lossiemouth became the first operational unit to be equipped with Buccaneer aircraft. On 18 October one of these, XN 980, made a low-level pass over Nelson's Column to mark the 160th anniversary of Trafalgar – an impressive photograph which was fully exploited by DPR(N) and DNR.

15 th	1945	The last 'service' launch of a Fairey Swordfish from a RN carrier – <i>Ocean</i> ; but Cdr David Hobbs cautions that <i>Centaur</i> launched Swordfish LS326 and NF389 during the filming of 'Sink the Bismarck' in 1959, both aircraft were on Navy charge and flown by a serving crew.
16 th	1759	Eddystone Light first lit.
17 th	1918	Monitors <i>General Wolfe</i> and <i>Lord Clive</i> bombarded German positions on the Belgian coast, the last occasion on which the RN fired 18-in guns in action.
18 th	1949	Lt HRH The Duke of Edinburgh RN joined the destroyer <i>Chequers</i> (Capt J.E.H. McBeath RN, Captain (D) 1st DF) at Malta as First Lieutenant.
19 th	1939	Supply of dentures to Serving Ratings. 'An initial supply of dentures at the public expense is allowable to serving ratings of all branches, including recruits and Royal Marine ranks, provided: 1a. The supply is essential to render the man dentally fit for general service . . . 1b. The need for the supply had not arisen through the man's imprudence or fault.' – AFO 3074/39.
20 th	1914	<i>Glitra</i> , first British merchant ship to be sunk by a German submarine, torpedoed by U-17 14 miles W.S.W. of Skudenaes. Until then the submarine had been regarded as an anti-warship weapon.
21 st	1844	Capt George Moubray, Captain of HMS <i>Victory</i> at anchor in Portsmouth Harbour, had to move smartly when HM Queen Victoria and HRH Prince Albert came up the side unheralded. The Queen, entering harbour from Osborne en route to Windsor, had seen the laurel wreaths at the ship's masthead and, on being reminded that it was Trafalgar Day and told that the wreaths were hoisted in memory of Admiral Nelson, decided to have a look round.
22 nd	1994	<i>Resolution</i> , Britain's first Polaris submarine, paid off after sixty-nine patrols.
23 rd	1943	Light cruiser <i>Charybdis</i> sunk by the German TBs T-23 and T-27 off Triagoz Island, France (48.59N, 03.39W). Destroyer <i>Limbourne</i> torpedoed by the German TBs T-22 and T-24 in the same position; sunk by <i>Talybont</i> and <i>Rocket</i> . Operation Tunnel. Ships: <i>Charybdis</i> , <i>Grenville</i> , <i>Limbourne</i> , <i>Rocket</i> , <i>Stevenstone</i> , <i>Talybont</i> , <i>Wensleydale</i> . Dead washed ashore on Channel Islands; buried by islanders despite German occupation. The only RN cruiser lost in 1943.
24 th	1805	A major newspaper scoop gained by the <i>Gibraltar Chronicle</i> with news of Trafalgar following receipt of Collingwood's letter to General Fox, the Governor. <i>The Times</i> first reported the news on 6 November.
25 th	2007	The ship's bell of the battleship <i>Prince of Wales</i> , sunk off Malaya on 10 December 1941 and retrieved by RN divers in August 2002, was handed over by Rear-Admiral Alan Massey, ACNS, at Admiralty House, Portsmouth, to the Malaysian Minister of Foreign Affairs for exhibitions to mark fifty years of Malaysian independence. The bell was returned in the destroyer <i>Edinburgh</i> in August 2008 and is preserved in Merseyside Maritime Museum.
26 th	1944	Carrier <i>Implacable</i> (Admiral Sir Henry Moore), light cruiser <i>Mauritius</i> and six destroyers of 26th DF successfully attacked shipping between

		Bodo and Rorvik (and on 27th and 28th). Operation Athletic. FAA Sqn: Barracuda: 828, 841; Firefly: 1771; Seafire: 887, 894.
27 th	2002	The RN's newest warship, the frigate <i>St Albans</i> , alongside in Portsmouth, damaged when P&O ferry <i>Pride of Portsmouth</i> from Le Havre, entering harbour in gale-force winds at 0500 on a Sunday, slewed off course and collided with the frigate's port side. Port bridge wing and 30-mm gun deck were buckled and damage to starboard side hull. The frigate returned to sea on 12 February 2003.
28 th	1958	First flight of the pre-production Wasp helicopter (XS463), flown by Ron Gellatly, from White Waltham.
29 th	1792	Last of <i>Bounty</i> mutineers executed at Spithead.
30 th	1954	X 51 (<i>Stickleback</i>) set new altitude record for a submarine – 279m. (This was reached on a railway track on Shap Summit.)
31 st	1967	Cunard liner RMS <i>Queen Mary</i> , departing Southampton for the last time en route to Long Beach, California, was played off from 107 Berth by a RM band. She was over-flown by fourteen RN helicopters in anchor formation: six Whirlwinds of 771 NAS, six Wessex of 826 NAS and two Wasps of 829 NAS. Once clear of The Nab channel, the carrier <i>Hermes</i> steamed past and cheered ship.
